Russians Will Be Asked to Leave Aland Islands

Stockholm, Feb. 15.—At the request of the Swedish government, the Bolshevik representative here, will leave for the Aland Islands to-day on board a warship to induce the Russian soldiers there to stop their acts of violence against the inhabitants. The Russians also will be asked to leave the islands on Swedish vessels.

Engines Again Running Through to Philadelphia

Altoona, Feb. 15.—Improvement in weather conditions has permitted the resumption of the Pennsy plan to have passenger engines run through trains run direct from Altoona to Philadelphia, over two divisions. Prior to last month when the weather became so severe, the company used locomotives between Altoona and the Quaker City, thus eliminating the changing of engines at Harrisburg. The plan worked out successfully and released other equipment for longer runs. Notice was issued last evening by Superintendent Smith, of the Middle division, that engines for trains Nos. 4, 14, 42, 20, 34, 2, 8, 24, 46, 10 and 6, running out of this city, should carry sufficient coal and oil to permit a through run to Philadelphia. All other eastward trains will discontinue stopping for fuel or oil at Denholm, west of Harrisburg. The warmer weather has been of great advantage to the railroad and the freight movement has been larger on each day this week than it has been on any previous day in months.

\$2,500 LOSS BY FIRE AT LEMOYNE

Miller's Butchershop in Hummel Avenue Completely Destroyed This Morning

Lemoyne, Feb. 15.—Fire this morning destroyed the butcher shop of Frank L. Miller, in Hummel avenue, together with a thousand pounds of choice meats and supplies. The damage is estimated at about \$2,500. The fire was discovered by Mr. Miller about 6:30 o'clock, when he went into the shop after getting his breakfast. About 6 o'clock he made fire underneath the kettle in the boiler-room and had gone into the house a short distance away, for his morning meal. On his return he found the boiler-room in a blaze. On an effort to get into another section of the building to remove his automobile truck he was badly burned about the face and hands. The Lemoyne fire company was summoned and later a call for assistance was sent to the Harrisburg department. The Hope company was sent over, but was not needed. The Harrisburg company had considerable trouble in getting to the scene on account of the condition of the roads.
