Dispatcher to Direct Trolley Car Traffic

To avoid congestion of traffic at the corner of Cameron and Market streets, the Harrisburg Railway Company has announced that a dispatcher will be placed on that corner to facilitate the handling of the big crowds in rush hours.

The dispatcher will see that cars move away from the corner promptly and will also act as an announcer. When a car is leaving and there are prospects of seating more than capacity, he will announce when the next car for the same destination will arrive.

Regular schedules are now being kept on all lines, company officials say, and the time between cars will be but a few minutes.

During the morning hours, cars returning from Steelton as "specials" must pick up passengers. Those which do not go to Market Square and are destined for the car barn, must announce that they will go to Cameron and Market streets and that passengers must be transferred. This is to avoid passengers waiting a long time on regular cars.

The new dispatcher is given authority to send a car destined for the car barn, to any other line, if there are a large number of passengers abroad, who are bound for that line.
