Only 26 Could Be Used After Entire Battalion Had Volunteered. With the American Army in France, Monday, Feb. 25.—Details of the Franco-American raid in the Chemin-des-Dames Saturday show twenty-six picked American soldiers participated after every member of their battalion had volunteered. The Americans moved forward eagerly with the attack behind a barrage fire, the first time this has been done by our troops. Some of the Americans made captures and others killed several Hun soldiers through the trenches, going beyond the objectives sought.

BIG U. S. GUNS ROAR ON TWO WAR FRONTS

Washington, Feb. 26.—American-built ordnance of the latest type and heaviest caliber—ten-inch, twelve-inch and fourteen-inch rifles—are in service on the sector of the western front held by the American Army and on the Italian front, it was learned to-day at the War Department. The general belief has been that very few American heavy guns were in Europe.

BOLSHEVIK DIG BEFORE GERMANS

Petrograd. A general mobilization of the workmen and working women who are supporting the councils was ordered everybody being directed to report to the Smolny Institute, the Bolshevik headquarters. Motor cars were requisitioned and the trams were kept running all night filled with soldiers and members of the Red Guard who were dispatched to the various railway stations.

German Occupation of Russia Not Enough to Restore the Monarchy

London, Feb. 26.—Signing of a Russo-German peace will not be the final step in the German problems on her eastern frontier and the final settlement will come when the peoples of Courland, Estonia, Livonia and Latvia matters in their own hands, according to Mr. Kamenoff, one of the Bolshevik delegates to the Brest-Litovsk negotiations.

He specifies: "Variations in the quantities of an ounce under this weight are permitted in individual loaves, but the average weight of not less than twenty-four loaves shall not be less than the prescribed weight."

ADMINISTRATION FOR SHORT COAL

Washington, Feb. 26.—Responsibility for the coal shortage was placed squarely on the fuel administration by Senator Reed of Missouri to-day in a "statement of facts" submitted to the Senate subcommittee on manufacturers as a basis for a report to the Senate on the coal situation. Senator Reed's statement was not the report of the subcommittee which investigated the fuel and coal administration, but a statement of his individual conclusions on the facts.
