

Two New Ships a Day by May, Is Promise of Commerce Committee

Washington, March 16—President Wilson to-day discussed the general shipbuilding situation with Senator Fletcher of Florida, chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee, and Senator Ransdell, of Louisiana, a member of the committee. The president is understood to be the first of a series which the President plans to hold with members of the committee, which has been investigating the shipping situation for many weeks.

After listening to the results of the Senate committee inquiry, the President is said to have expressed satisfaction with the outlook at the present time, and agreed with Senator Fletcher that the nation should produce from 5,000 to 6,000,000 tons of shipping of all kinds this year. Mr. Wilson was understood to have expressed particular interest in the proposed concrete ship launched on the Pacific coast and to desire that the vessel receive a thorough trial because of the short time which this class of craft can be turned out.

MRS. ALDEN GIVES TALK ON COOKING

Demonstration on Making Bread and Rolls With Corn Meal by Red Cross Officer

Mrs. C. A. Alden, last night gave some timely hints on making bread, rolls and waffles with substitutes at the weekly food conservation demonstration of the Red Cross headquarters last night.

Nut Bread—1 1/2 cups flour, 1 1/2 cups corn flour, 3/4 cup sugar, 4 teaspoonsful baking powder, rounding; 1 scant teaspoonful salt, 1 egg, 3/4 cup chopped walnuts, 1 1/2 cup milk. Let stand twenty-five minutes before baking. Bake between thirty and forty minutes.

Corn Meal Parker House Rolls—Sift together 1 1/2 cups white flour, 1/2 cup corn meal, 1/2 teaspoonful baking powder, 1/2 teaspoonful salt, 1/2 cup milk and turn into dry ingredients, making dough to handle.

Virginia Waffles—1/2 cup white corn meal, 1 1/2 cups boiling water, 1/2 teaspoonful salt, 1/2 cup milk, 2 tablespoonful sugar, 2 tablespoonful butter, 2 cups flour, 1/2 cup sweet milk. Mix and sift dry ingredients except the graham flour. Combine molasses and milk and add to dry ingredients. Pour into well-greased moulds and steam three hours. Dry in oven.

Spoon Bread—2 cups white meal, 2 1/2 cups boiling water, 1 1/2 tablespoonful melted butter, 1/2 teaspoonful salt, 1/2 cup milk, 2 eggs, 1 1/2 cup buttermilk, 1 cup spoonful baking powder. Add meal gradually to the boiling water and stir cool. Add butter, salt, egg yolks slightly beaten and buttermilk mixed with soda. Beat two minutes and fold in white of eggs beaten until stiff. Turn into a buttered pudding dish and bake in hot oven forty minutes. Serve at breakfast. Tat with spoon.

New York, March 16.—American labor in New York last night took a decided stand in favor of the "no peace without victory" policy enunciated by President Wilson. At a meeting of the New York Central Federated Union, in the Labor Temple, at 243 East Eighty-fourth street, which had as its guests W. A. Appleton and Joshua Butterworth of the British Labor Mission visiting this country, a proposal to have trade unions in the United States get behind a movement to end the war by international conferences instead of fighting was howled down with a roar of protest.
