TECH TOSSERS YANK YORKERS, LEAGUE LEADERS

Maroons Set Pace in Last Night's Game; Good Work by the Referee

In a game that was full of brilliant plays on the part of the victors, Tech High last night at York won out over the York five, score 42 to 30. This victory puts the Maroons in reach of this season's flag.

Two men were put out of the game, Kohlman and Bosserman. McConnell, of this city, was referee and his decisions did not bring one kick.

Notes of the Game

Tech started right off in the first half and pried up a commanding lead, which York was unable to overcome.

Tech's defense weakened at the start of the second half, but Captain Huston brought his men back with his good judgment and encouragement.

York became dangerous in the second half and with about ten minutes of the half gone the score stood 23 to 24 in Tech's favor.

Buddy Lingie was easily the star of the game. His floor work was the best seen on the York floor this season.

Beck played his usual strong game at guard, holding his man without a field goal and scoring five field goals himself.

Johnny Smith played a good game at guard for Tech in the first half. He was replaced by Kohlman in the second half.

Captain Huston was high scorer of the evening with 22 points to his credit.

Kohlman, of Tech, and Bosserman, of York, were both put out of the game by foul play. Miller replaced Kohlman.

Wilsbach and McLaughlin roughed it up throughout the game, but never came to blows.

McLaughlin was York's best scorer, making a total of 15 points.

About 100 Tech rooters accompanied the team and under the leadership of Joe Schmidt they kept up their cheering throughout the game.

Dave McConnell refereed the game and his work was unquestioned by both teams.


