

**PUSHING WORK ON PENN-HARRIS; MATERIAL HERE**

Expect to Finish Big Hotel Early Next Winter; Now Building Rear Wing

Work on the new million-dollar Penn-Harris Hotel is progressing rapidly. Officials in charge of the construction of the immense structure are using every means to hurry the work so that the hotel may be finished before the next winter.

The second floor of the rear wing is now being constructed. The kitchen will be on this floor. Plumbers from Chicago have been brought here to speed up the work. Bathrooms are now being installed on the first five floors.

Brickwork on the exterior of the building has been completed up to the eighth floor, and some work has been done above that height. Steel sashes have been placed up to the height of the brickwork, several stories of glass have been installed.

and the other sashes are now being glazed.

Virtually all of the hardware for the entire building has already been received. That which is not now being used will be stored for future use. Almost all of the staircases have been placed, and there is a connecting chain of the staircases from the basement to the top.

Most of the plumbing fixtures are here. The architectural terracotta has been received and the last car of granite is on the way to Harrisburg. All of the window panes and sashes have been received.

W. L. Stoddard, supervising architect, was here recently, inspecting the job and he will return next week to oversee the work. R. E. Hawes, architectural engineer representing Mr. Stoddard and E. A. Johnston, construction superintendent, are in charge of the new building. Harry D. Gilbert is in charge of the brick work construction.

**ELEVENTH WARD FOR BEIDLEMAN**

Resolution Adopted by Republican Association Endorses Him

"Whereas, He is a native born citizen of our county, having received his early training in our public schools, and having spent his entire lifetime among us, devoting a great portion thereof to acts of kindness and sacrifices for his many friends in this community, and especially taking interest in the welfare of the workingman as a champion in both House and Senate of all labor legislation, particularly safety regulations in mines and the Pull Car law, we heartily commend him to the public in general as a most worthy citizen, and especially to that great class of our citizens, the workingmen, for his conspicuous zeal, as a fit and proper person to represent them in this important office; and  
"Whereas, His life among us all these years has evidenced nothing but

uprightness, honor and integrity, and his conduct both private and public at all times being exemplary, we take great pleasure in commending him to the support of our own County of Dauphin, but the state at large for the exalted office of Lieutenant Governor thereof, to be held.  
"Resolved, That the Eleventh Ward Republican Association, of the City of Harrisburg, endorse his candidacy and use every honorable means within its power to bring his nomination and election as Lieutenant Governor of this great state."

**Will Establish Training Camps For Officers in Four Colleges of Nation**

Washington, March 29.—Establishment of infantry units of the senior division, officers training corps at the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia; Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill.; University of Denver, and Pomona College, Claremont, California, was announced today by the War Department.

In each case the college authorities have agreed to accept the two year course in military instruction a prerequisite for graduation of every physically fit student.

**Marshall's Speech Infuriates Republicans**

Madison, Wis., March 29.—If the protest that has gone on from the Republican ranks in any indication of the feeling of the Wisconsin G. O. then Vice-President Theodore Roosevelt has stirred up a hornet's nest with his recent utterance that "to save Wisconsin to the Union, Mr. Davies must be elected."  
This remark is reported to have sent the Badger Republicans into a rage, and drew a scathing rebuff especially from Irvine L. Lenroot, the Republican opponent of Joseph P. Davies, the Democratic nominee.  
Lenroot classed the Marshall speech as "monstrous" and "slanders" on the people of Wisconsin.  
He also predicted his own election by 50,000 majority.

**City Teachers to Be Examined April 20-27**

The schedule of examinations for provisional and professional certificates for city teachers has been announced by City Superintendent F. E. Downes as follows: April 20, arithmetic, history and spelling; afternoon, geography, teaching and civics; April 27, algebra, White's management, botany, physical geography; afternoon, physiology, music and drawing.  
The examinations will be held in the study hall of the Technical High school. Reading examinations will be held April 26.

**A. NEWTON SWOPE**  
Huntingdon, Pa., March 29.—Ex-prothonotary A. Newton Swope of Huntingdon died yesterday morning of heart disease, in his 58th year. He was one of the founders of the Mount Pleasant Times and in 1839 founded the Mapleton Item, which he controlled until a few weeks ago. He was clerk of courts of Huntingdon county from 1906 to 1912. For many years he was engaged in the manufacture of glass sand near Mapleton.
