YOUNG WOMAN HANGS HERSELF

"Good-by, Ben," Parting Message to Brother Before Attempted Suicide

Waynesboro, Pa., April 24.—"Goodby, Ben, this is the last time you will see me," was the parting message of Miss Anna Myers, of Fayetteville, near Chambersburg, who was found hanging to the end of a rope in the attic of her home, yesterday by her brother, who quickly cut her down and sent for a physician, who succeeded in resuscitating her, but she died before she could be taken to a hospital.

Yesterday morning Miss Myers came to the door of her home with other members of the family to see some guests off, who were taking the trolley to Chambersburg. Her brother, Benjamin Myers, was the conductor on the car.
