

PENROSE CALLS FOR LAW CHANGE

Says Woodward Court Suits Have Shown Necessity of Altering Primary Act

Senator Boies Penrose declared in Philadelphia yesterday that the primary laws of Pennsylvania should be changed so that such tricks as were tried to "camouflage" James F. Woodward and Dr. George Woodrow on the ballot should be prevented by a change of the primary law. He said the practice is becoming common among what he termed "small fry politicians."

"It is my opinion," said Senator Penrose, "that a law should be passed at the next session of the Legislature which would prevent conspirators to cheat the voters. This case of the Chauffeur Woodward is a very glaring and scandalous one and is only equalled by the similar effort made in Reading to elect a member for another Woodward so as to deceive the voters concerning the candidacy of Representative Woodward, of McKeesport, for Secretary of Internal Affairs."

"This is a common practice with small fry politicians, and in this instance is characteristic and illustrative of the methods and purposes of the Ogle-Scott alliance. In the end these fraudulent attempts generally react upon the perpetrators. I am not informed as to what action the Republican City Committee will take toward endorsing candidates; moreover, the City Committee nor the State Committee ought not to be called upon to endorse candidates of any kind. A campaign committee is intended to elect candidates after they are nominated. It is a gross abuse of the control of the party machinery to attempt to influence the popular primary by such methods. Furthermore, the practice is highly irregular from the general point of view. No one has ever heard of a national committee endorsing anyone for President, no one has ever heard of a state committee endorsing anyone for a state office. Of course, individual members may express a preference or exert themselves in behalf of some candidate."

"If, as it has been reported, officeholders are to be called in and consulted, the situation becomes worse, because they are supposed to keep out of politics. Such activities destroy the whole spirit of the popular primary."

"All reports which I receive from up state show increasing strength for Sprout and Beideman. Senator Beideman in particular. The dominant thought seems to be that it is an outrage for any faction in Philadelphia to attempt to demand representation on the state ticket for a Philadelphia candidate. The up-state Republicans feel outraged and disgusted with the political and municipal conditions in Philadelphia, and there is unanimous thought that Philadelphia should cleanse its own house before its people can be entitled to ask representation on a ticket which requires the support of the Republicans of the state."
