

PENNSYLVANIANS KILLED ON WAR FRONT OVERSEAS

John H. Siple, Wrightsville, Pa., Among the Twelve Severely Wounded

Washington, June 6.—The Army casualty list to-day contained thirty-four names, divided as follows: Killed in action, seven; died of wounds, three; died of accident, three; died of disease, four; wounded severely, twelve; wounded, degree undetermined, one; wounded slightly, three; missing in action, one.

Officers named were: Lieut. A. P. H. Sage, Memphis, Tenn., died of wounds; Lieut. William D. Hill, Cleburne, Texas, and Bernard C. Wolcott, Binghamton, N. Y., were wounded severely.

FREDERICK P. STEFF, SR., DIES AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

The local branch of Chas. M. Steff, Inc., received a telegram this morning announcing the death of the senior member of the firm, Frederick P. Steff, Sr., who died at his home, in Baltimore, Wednesday.

Mr. Steff had been the active head of the firm of Chas. M. Steff, Inc., since the death of his father, in 1861. He was one of the best-known piano manufacturers of the United States. Mr. Steff was born in Baltimore in 1840, and has been prominently associated in many business and educational institutions as well as religious. He has been especially active in the Lutheran Church work, and has held many important positions in the Lutheran Synod for many years past. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Frederick P. Steff, Sr., one daughter, Miss Florence Steff, and two sons, George Waters Steff and Lieutenant Frederick P. Steff, Jr.
