FOCH CONCLUDES WAY TO VICTORY IS TO STRIKE

Defensive Movements Only Result in Pauses in Battle; Reserves Hold the Key

London, June 10.—That battles can be won in the end only by the army which takes the offensive is the significant declaration made by General Foch, commander-in-chief of the allies, in an important article contributed by him to the weekly journal, The Field, in which he discusses the problem of the soldier and the way to victory.
