LENINE AND TROTSKY HAVE FLED FOR MURMAN COAST AND SAFETY, SAYS RUMOR

MORE EVIDENCE OF DEATH OF EX-CZARISMADE PUBLIC

GERMAN TROOPS AND FORMER COMMANDERS OF THE COSSACKS SAID TO BE WORKING TOGETHER IN MOSCOW

London, June 28.—According to unconfirmed reports to-day the Bolsheviki government in Moscow has been overthrown, says a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Copenhagen.

Moscow, the reports add, has been captured by General Korniloff, supported by German troops. General Kaledines is said to have co-operated with General Korniloff in the capture of Moscow.

Advices from the same sources assert that Grand Duke Nicholas has been proclaimed emperor. Nikolai Lenine, the premier, and Leon Trotzky, the minister of war, are said to have fled to the Murman coast.

The Exchange Telegraph Company publishes its message containing the reports of the Bolsheviki overthrow and the accompanying details "with reserve," and points out that the information emanates mainly from German sources and therefore should be received with caution.

The Copenhagen newspapers, the agency dispatch adds, give prominence to a Berlin dispatch quoting the Tages Zeitung of that city as follows: Grand Duke Ascendant "It is believed here that the Bolsheviki government will soon be overthrown and that Kerensky is the man of the future in Russia."
