

SALE OF STRIP TICKETS TO CITY SUBURBS TO STOP

Harrisburg Railways Company to Charge Full Fare on Suburban Lines

Affirming that stockholders were being paid no dividends for the money invested in the stock of the company, officials of the Harrisburg Railways Company, following a special meeting of the board of directors late yesterday afternoon, announced that on and after August 1, all trip tickets on the several lines of the concern will be eliminated.

The adoption of the flat zone fare rate was made necessary, it is said, that the increased proceeds may help to bear the higher costs of labor and materials. Travelers between Middletown, Hummelstown, Linglestown, Charloton, Highspire, Rutherford, Oberlin and Rockville will be affected by the abolition of the trip ticket.

To-day copies of the supplement to the company's notice were filed with the Public Service Commission and posted at various places throughout the city, effective after thirty days.

A flat jump of two cents over the present five cent zone rate is contemplated by the Valley Railways Company, reaching all West Shore towns, President C. H. Bidlop, announced. An increase to six cents would not aid in meeting the shortage, he declares.

YANKS READY FOR EXPECTED GERMAN BLOW

Stand Shoulder to Shoulder With French to Spoil Another Teuton Push

Washington, July 2.—Resumption of the German offensive on the west front is expected momentarily by Army officers here. General Pershing's reports, as well as French and British advices from the front, have shown daily increasing enemy activity, indicating that the Germans are preparing for another assault.

There is great stir and movement among the Germans before the American lines around Chateau Thierry. Part of the coming drive may be directed against this front in a renewal of the thrust at Paris through the Compiègne gateway. If so, an army corps of American troops stands shoulder to shoulder with the French to block the road.

Secretary Baker disclosed yesterday that organization of the First Army Corps, under Major General Hunter Liggett, probably had been completed, although he made no announcement. "I suspect," the Secretary said in reply to a question, "that several of our divisions are operating together as an army corps under command of General Liggett. Whether any other divisions have been created into the army corps and a tentative army corps commander chosen I have not heard."

It was learned also that the First, Second and Third Divisions (regularly commanded, respectively, by Major Generals Robert L. Bullard, Omar Bundy and Joseph T. Dickman, are included in the First Corps and all are either at Chateau Thierry or at Cantigny. The corps organization plan, however, calls for two divisions four combatant and two replacement, and with the necessary artillery units and other additional troops the total strength of a corps would be nearly 220,000 men. Undoubtedly General Liggett has all the elements necessary for his corps if his organization is complete.

Liggett at Head of New Force in Two Sections

Washington, July 2.—Just as signs are multiplying that a new German offensive is imminent on the west front, it has become known that a complete Army Corps of the first troops is ready to take its place in the line with the French to block any thrust at Paris through the Compiègne region. Secretary Baker disclosed the fact that the organization of the First Army Corps, under Major General Hunter Liggett had probably been completed, although he made no formal announcement.


