

DUPLEX TRUCK CO. HAS NEW FACTORY

Two New Buildings Give More Than 100,000 Additional Square Feet of Floor

The new factory building of the Duplex Truck Company, Lansing, Michigan, have been completed and production of four-wheel drive motor trucks has been increased to 10 a day.

The new buildings give the Duplex company over 100,000 additional square feet of floor space, one building being 72 feet wide and 400 feet long and the other 72 feet by 300 feet, both are two-story structures.

President H. M. Lee says that approximately 3,100 trucks, valued at \$12,400,000, will be built by the Duplex Truck Company during 1918.

Conservation Materials, Cadillac Dealers Told

The movement for conservation of materials is receiving new impetus, so far as motorcar materials are concerned, from motorcar manufacturers.

The Cadillac Motor Car Company has just issued a bulletin urging its distributors and dealers to do everything possible to assist in the conservation of steel, and asks that instructions be passed on to shop foremen and workmen to co-operate in every way they can.

In its communication to the dealer organization, the company cites instances of paying hardware prices for steel. It points out that when a car owner bends or dents a fender, it should be straightened, or the dents bumped out, rather than thrown away and replaced with a new fender.

Cannot Set Aside Marriage of Boy

Syracuse, N. Y.—Justice William M. Ross' decision holding that a marriage contracted by a boy of 19 years without the consent of his parents cannot be annulled was unanimously upheld by the appellate division, fourth department. The test case which the court passed upon was the marriage of William Chenoweth and Miss Catherine Silver solemnized on February 24, 1916.

The theory on which the action was brought by Attorney Clarence Uncles was that the age of 21 years had not been reached by the boy and therefore the consent of his parents to the match was required. Justice Ross dismissed the complaint following the ruling of Justice David P. Manning of New York, holding that 18 years is the legal consent age in marriages. Justice Ross held that the age of 21 applied only when residents of this state went into others to contract marriages.

TRUCKS BUILT TO CARRY OVER LOAD

Reo Trucks Are Built Fifty Per Cent. Oversized in All Vital Points

"We have a peculiar problem in human nature with which to contend in the making of motortrucks," says Horace T. Thomas, chief engineer of the Reo Motor Car Company.

That is the propensity which is almost universal, to overload a truck. "Any maker who would make a truck whose maximum load capacity was 1,500 pounds and then label it a three-quarter-ton vehicle would find he had a mighty short-lived truck. Not once in fifty times would the load be three-quarter tons or less. In many cases it would be fifty twice that."
