

### YANKS IN LINE AGAINST HUNS' PREMIER TROOPS

In Each Instance American Troops Return to Fray With Great Spirit

With the American Army on the Aisne-Marne Front, July 30.—The American troops last night still held the apex of their advance, won after a struggle with the Germans in which the opposing lines moved forward and backward time and again. Sergy, on the north bank of the Ourcq, changing hands six times.

Could Not Cross River  
The first efforts of the guards and Bavarians were partly successful and the Americans were forced to withdraw from Sergy and a few other positions, including the town of Serrigny et Nestles. But the Germans could not force the main body across the river. The stream is narrow and shallow, and some detachments at times were driven back, but always there remained enough Americans on the north bank to check the German rushes, and in every instance the Americans returned to the fray with great spirit. It was a veteran American division, and yesterday's opposition to the terrific onslaught made against it justified the confidence of the staff that it was more than equal to anything the Crown Prince had to offer.

### BIG PHONE MEN READY TO HELP U. S. WIRE PLAN

Theodore N. Vail and Others Assure Burleson of Their Support

Washington, July 30.—Theodore N. Vail, president of the American Bell Telephone Company, yesterday assured Postmaster General Burleson of full co-operation of himself and all officials of the company in administering the wire systems of the nation. Mr. Vail, accompanied by President Bethel, of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company, and Attorney Kingsbury, of the Bell system, held an all-day conference with the Postmaster General and his associates on the Post Office Committee on Telephones and Telegraph.

The telephone officials came to Washington at the request of Mr. Burleson and his assistants to discuss Bell methods of operation. Details of the operating system were laid before the post office officials in detail. Messrs. Vail, Bethel and Kingsbury answered all inquiries, and told the Postmaster General their services were at his command at any time they may be needed. Officials of independent telephone companies and the telegraph companies will come to Washington for a like conference later this week.

### WAR PROFITS TAX AND EXCESS ALSO IN REVENUE BILL

Committee Plans to Give the Treasury Option of Using Either System

Washington, July 30.—There will be a war profits tax, based upon the English system, as well as an excess profits tax written into the \$8,000,000,000 revenue bill, according to Representative Henry T. Rainey, acting chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, preparing the bill.

This selective system of taxation, originally recommended by the Treasury Department, will be adopted as the only way to justly reach all taxable corporations. Many corporations are making less money since the war than before and therefore would not pay as heavy a tax under the English system, as under the excess profits plan, based upon capital. Many of the larger corporations made more money just prior to the war than since because the price-fixing system has reduced their profits. On the other hand, a vast number of small corporations have made greater profits tax based on capital would not net as big a revenue to the government as a tax on the war profits.

### SEIZE GERMAN AS DECOY FOR U-BOAT RAIDS

Radio Outfit Is Found on His Farm Near Jersey Coast

New York, July 30.—Bruno Opperman, an enemy alien, has been arrested on his farm at Englishtown, N. J., twenty miles due west of Long Branch. It was learned yesterday, on suspicion that he attempted to signal to German submarines off the Atlantic coast by means of wireless. A few minor parts, lacking only a wireless apparatus, and a tall flagpole with wires running to its peak in the manner known as the "umbrella aerial" for wireless telegraphy, were found on his farm.

### Say Teacher Was Dropped For Red Cross Activities

Manhoy City, Pa., July 30.—Charging she was guilty of neglect of duty, the Rahn township school board dismissed Miss Florence Deibert as a teacher. The alleged neglect was her Red Cross activities. The school board is said to be of Teutonic ancestry. The Rahn township people have circulated a petition which will be presented to the board demanding her reinstatement. Indignation is at flood tide in Rahn.
