

**CAMP MEADE  
SOLDIER GIVEN  
10-YEAR TERM**

Depot Brigade Private Refused to Obey Orders of Superior Officer

Camp Meade, Md., July 31.—For refusing to obey an order from a superior officer, Private Wasil Kriworic, Twenty-third Company, of the 154th Depot Brigade, will have ten years to serve. By the terms of an order issued yesterday the soldier has been sentenced to hard labor for that period of time, at the United States disciplinary barracks, at Fort Jay, New York.

The importance of obedience and the necessity of observing all commands and regulations had been fully explained to the soldier. In spite of this Kriworic flatly refused to do work assigned him by First Lieutenant William F. Dalton. He also will forfeit all pay and allowances due or to become due, and when he has served his term he will be dishonorably discharged from the Army. The findings of the court were approved by the reviewing authorities without comment.

Brigadier General Joseph A. Gaston announced the names of the thirty-four officers who will command the companies of the new 808th Infantry. There is important work ahead for this regiment, in fact all pioneer units are called upon to play an important part because they serve in a dual capacity. Not only do they fight as ordinary doughboys, but they are trained as experts in trench digging and in building defenses. The men of this regiment are from several states—Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia and Tennessee.

**TRADE BETWEEN  
SOUTH AMERICA  
AND U.S. SET BACK**

Entrance of America Into War Put End to Extensive Shipping

Washington, July 31.—Commercial relations between the United States and South America are in a serious condition because of the war.

The lack of shipping has caused a decrease in the amount of manufactured goods exported to Argentina, and the factories of that country are unable to meet the demand. Some of the factories require raw materials that have formerly been obtained in the United States and have been compelled to shut down or greatly to curtail their forces.

The entrance of the United States into the war marked the end of extensive shipping between this country and Argentina. Besides a few steamships some sailing vessels still visit Argentina, according to consular advice, but they are so small that navigation is dangerous and they do not even approximate the demands of commerce. The most needed articles are heavy iron castings and coal.

Argentine businessmen are greatly concerned because some of the vessels arriving at Buenos Aires have come in ballast, caused, they say, by the fact that they were sent away from the United States hurriedly to get the cargoes of products in Argentina that are needed in this country.

The United States has a credit of \$60,000,000 in Buenos Aires, which will be increased, according to this information, by \$40,000,000 to be used as a basis of exchange in trade. It is said this situation requires diplomatic arrangement and that this is one of the affairs to occupy the attention of Ambassador Naon, who has just returned to Washington after six months' absence.

Materials from Argentina sought by the United States and the other nations at war with Germany include beef, sheep hides and wool, principally. According to official figures recently issued by the Argentine government there are 80,000,000 sheep in the republic, compared with 43,000,000 in 1914, the last year in which figures are available. The wool clip last year was situated at 140,000,000 kilos, valued at approximately \$150,000,000. The total exports of Argentina last year aggregated about \$175,000,000 and the imports \$190,000,000. There were 3,000,000 head of cattle exported, principally to the United States, England and France.

To meet the situation caused by the lack of ships the Argentine government has decided to change several old warships to merchant vessels and to buy more ships wherever they can be found. This is another of the problems with which Ambassador Naon will deal.

Similar conditions are reported from Chile. Exports from the United States of manufactured goods have been virtually suspended except on a limited number of articles. Complaint is made that a large number of vessels from the United States arrive at Chilean ports in ballast to bring nitrates to the United States. Urgent request has been made to this country to permit those vessels to carry cargoes of needed commodities.

**Harrisburg to Seek U. S. Ruling That Prohibits Profiteering in Dwellings**

Profiteering in Harrisburg must stop members of the Mayor's Investigation committee said today, and an effort will be made to get a ruling from the government similar to the one which is now in effect in Philadelphia.

Linwood B. Wambaugh, chairman of the mayor's committee said: "The committee is very much encouraged to learn that the government ruling for Philadelphia prohibited the charging of rent on properties at a rate higher than ten per cent. on the taxable valuation of the houses. We will do everything possible to get a like ruling for Harrisburg so that prosecutions can be started in instances where landlords are charging exorbitant rents."

The ten per cent. rule was fixed in Philadelphia through the work of a profiteering committee of council of which W. T. Colburn, one of the councilmen, was chairman. An extensive investigation was made there and the committee then submitted a complete report to government officials.

Mayor Keister has communicated with Mayor Smith, of Philadelphia, to learn more about the procedure followed in that city. As soon as this information is received another meeting of the committee will be called, a report will be made to Washington and with it a request will be made for a ruling which will prevent profiteering in this city.

**Gettysburg People Urged to Economize in Water**

Gettysburg, Pa., July 31.—The local water company is urging the people to save water, the result of the heavy drain that is being made upon the capacity of the point. It is declared to be a question of the amount of water in Marsh creek, but rather a matter of the ability of the pumping station to deliver the filtered product. The plant is now working day and night and for all requirements have been met. Just now the town is fully protected in the event of fire. The company declares that water is now being wasted.
