If Wishes of Baseball Men Are Considered Secretary Will Succeed to Presidency

There are two candidates for the job of being president of the National League, now that John K. Tener has resigned. The bulk of baseball men are strong for Johnny Heydler, who has been secretary for the National Commission and has more executive ability than all the magnates rolled together.

John K. Tener was the eighth man to be elected president of the National Baseball League. He was chosen as the executive officer of that organization in December, 1913, and the constitution of the league was amended so that his term of office was extended to four years.

In 1913, when he was first elected to direct the affairs of the older major circuit, Mr. Tener was governor of Pennsylvania, and his term of office in that gubernatorial chair was not completed until 1915.

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

NATIONAL AMATEUR TARGET TITLE GOES TO HEER, OKLAHOMA

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 7.—After tussling with Fred Tomlin, of Pennsboro, N. J., with a score of 98, William H. Heer, of Guthrie, Okla., defeated the easterner in the shoot-off by one target, and won the national amateur championship at single target in the feature race of the second day's events of the nineteenth annual grand American handicap, at the South Shore Country Club.

Before this event had been decided Frank Troch, the sensational shot from Vancouver, Wash., won the national amateur doubles championship with a score of 90, and A. R. Chezik, of Portia, N. D.; B. F. Elbert, of Des Moines, Ia., and D. Fauske, of Worthington, Minn., went into a triple tie for first place in the Chicago overtime, a 100-bird event from the sixteen-yard range.





Terestchenko, Victim of Assassin, Was Kerensky Cabinet Foreign Minister

Paris, Aug. 7.—M. I. Terestchenko, minister for foreign affairs in the cabinet of Premier Kerensky, has been assassinated at Pottava according to an announcement made by the Hamburg 'Freidenblatt', and reprinted by Paris newspapers. The identity of his assassins it is declared is not known.

A report received in London on July 6 said that Terestchenko had arrived at Bergen, Norway, from Russia and would go to Paris to join Premier Kerensky. It is possible he may have gone back to Russia through the Ukraine. Pottava is in eastern Ukraine, southeast of Kiev.

MARINES LIVE UP TO RECORD

The U. S. Marines have astonished the world by their work against the Hun during the past several months. Harrisburg is proud of the men that she has given to this branch of the service.

Immediately after that incisive onslaught by the French front, word came that the Germans were affrontedly averse to holding a party of any sort opposite those same hard-hitting, absolutely deadly Marines.

One regiment of them, which distinguished itself for its business-like mopping up of that Hun-infested salient, was rushed straight to the battlefield from its landing stage on the shore of France.

Behind that regiment's magnificent work from the tap of the bell lies the wonderful story of the training which is being given to the corps which is being given to the corps among the thousands of recruits now being enlisted in the U. S. Marines.

There are two great and active training camps for U. S. Marine recruits; one for men enlisting East of the Mississippi, at Paris Island, close to the South Carolina coast, west of Charleston and Savannah.

Men trained as these have been are fit to encounter the best the Germans have; but the U. S. Marine Corps prides itself on doing a good job better than best. At Quantico, 30 miles south of Washington on the Virginia coast line, is the immense finishing camp that gives the alumni of Paris Island their post-graduate course before they sail for France.

No raw recruits at Quantico; the whole 6,000 who are constantly in training there have had their preliminary instruction prior to arrival. Here they get their specialized work
