RIVERSIDE MAY GET CITY WATER BY END OF YEAR

Council to Revise Proposed Changes in Sanitary Housing Code

Every effort will be made to arrange for an adequate water supply and sufficient fire protection for the Fourteenth ward before the end of the year. Commissioner S. F. Hassler, superintendent of the water department, said to-day in speaking of the conference of Council last night when he submitted complete data on the cost of the work.

It was also decided at the conference with the city health bureau that all the rules of the health department should be revised wherever necessary in order to include housing regulations which were considered by Council earlier in the week. At that time some of the commissioners said that some of the new provisions had been included a few years ago in health bureau regulations.

Commissioner Hassler in his estimate of the cost of installing sufficient mains and connections for fire protection in the Fourteenth ward said that the work and necessary materials will mean an expense of more than \$11,000.

At present there is only one fire plug in the ward which can be used by the city, according to Dr. Hassler. According to his plan short connections would be made by the city to water lines in the ward, and about 5,000 feet of additional pipe would be laid to which ten more fireplugs would be connected.

It is likely that the proposition of taking over the present water supply lines in the ward will be discussed soon with Dauphin Consolidated Water Company officials, as Commissioner Hassler and other members of Council said they are anxious to have the district provided with city water and afforded sufficient fire protection.

Two Perry Newspapers Announce Raise in Price

Newport, Pa., Sept. 18.—Increased cost of all kinds of material entering into the production of a newspaper has prompted two Perry county editors to decide on a raise in the subscription prices of their papers. Both are effective on October 1.

Francis A. Fry, of Newport, editor of the semi-weekly Newport News, the county's largest paper, has announced that effective with that date the subscription price of his paper will be advanced from \$1.75 to \$2 yearly. G. W. Deekard, of Liverpool, editor of the Liverpool Sun, has issued announcement that his price raise will be from \$1. to \$1.50 yearly.

MUCH CLOTHING COMING IN FOR BELGIAN DRIVE

Red Cross Drive For Stricken Belgians Begins Next Monday

Although the second clothing drive for the benefit of the people of Belgium does not officially open until next Monday, a large amount of clothing has already been received by Red Cross officials and Mrs. W. G. Gipple, receiving chairman of the campaign, is greatly pleased with the predrive results. It must be remembered, however, it is emphasized by Red Cross officials, that the chapter quota is twenty tons and the contributions already received are but a drop in the bucket.

Mrs. William Strouse, named as chairman in charge of collection of the clothing, is endeavoring to enlist the services of department stores and other motortruck drivers to collect the clothing. A number of trucks have already been engaged and it may be possible that the Boy Scouts will help in the campaign. A room is being secured for the campaign headquarters and work will begin in earnest Monday morning.

How big the need for this clothing is, has been shown by Henry P. Davison, chairman of the Red Cross War Council, in which he says: "Back of the German wall that for four years has hemmed in brave little Belgium and her neighbors in

Northern France, 10,000,000 human beings look to us for clothing as well as food. Even the well-to-do lack necessities, and the poor are in the direst need. All stocks of clothing and raw material have long since been exhausted. There has been no commercial imports since the first devastation of the country. The quantity of materials that the Commission for Relief has been permitted to import for manufacture into clothing has never been sufficient, and now the world is short both of clothing and raw material. We cannot purchase what is needed. But you can give it.

To relieve a plucky and long-suffering nation we must open up our stores of partly used clothing. The value of these supplies is inestimable. Your unused garments will clothe our oppressed allies as human beings should be clothed, save them from suffering, disease and death by protecting them against the cold and raw winters of Northern Europe."

Garments of every kind, for both sexes, and all ages, are needed, according to the appeal. Also piece goods which can be made into sheets, blankets and baby clothes. Only garments of strong materials will be accepted. Apparel of flimsy material or fancy clothing will not be taken. Prospective donors are reminded it will not be necessary to mend the garments as the repair work will give employment to the thousands of destitute women in the occupied regions.
