Dr. Hawes Asks That City Give More Time to Prayer

The bulletin-board message fronting on Dr. George Edward Hawes' Market Square Presbyterian Church has been changed. A text to meet the spiritual exigency of the times is usually found there, and until a day or two ago, when the Kaiser's false peace overtures emanating from Berlin were alarming Americans, there appeared this scriptural quotation: "In nothing be anxious. And the peace of God which passeth all understanding, shall guard your hearts and your thoughts in Christ Jesus."—Phil. 4:6, 7.

Now that that crisis is past and another in the form of a frightful epidemic has taken its place, Dr. Hawes has made public this quotation: "David built an altar unto the Lord, and offered burnt offerings and peace offerings. So the Lord was entreated for the land, and the plague was stayed."—II Sam. 24:25. The churches being closed on account of the influenza plague, Dr. Hawes very naturally thinks it a good time to pray for deliverance from the same. To this end he would advise more concerted public attention to the one-minute Angelus inaugurated in this city a short while ago. Harrisburg should pray more, says Dr. Hawes, and depend less upon itself.

TELEPHONE OPERATORS ARE ASKED TO HOLD THEIR JOBS

Telephone and telegraph operators and employees generally are asked by President Wilson through Postmaster Burleson to stick to their jobs and not seek other and more lucrative ones in other Government departments until the war is won and over for Uncle Sam. The President puts this course as a "duty" for all concerned. The attention of the telephone companies and their employees has been called to the matter through letters sent them by the management of the United States Independent Telephone Association. The message states that the President has suggested to the heads of several Federal departments to refrain from taking operators from the telephone and telegraph companies which are under Government control. Heavy depletion in the ranks of the latter because of this practice called forth this request of the President's.

Germans Flee So Fast Allies Cannot See Them; Pouring Out of Belgium

With the Allied Armies in Belgium, Oct. 17.—The Germans have started a retreat on a tremendous scale from Northern Belgium. French cavalry is approaching Thielet, seven miles from the banks of the Ghent-Bruges canal. The canal itself is only ten miles from the border of Holland. So fast is the enemy retreating that the French British and Belgian infantry, at least in the center of the battle front, have lost touch entirely with the enemy. The Belgians advancing astride the Thourout-Bruges and Thourout-Eskaterinostav and to have defeated the Germans, who are retreating rapidly. The Belgians have extended their battle front north of the Handzeeme canal, where they have made progress in the region of Schoore, five miles from the North Sea southeast of Nieupert, and generally gained ground eastward as far as Coelscamp, according to the official communication issued last night. The town of Iseghem, east of Roulers, has been captured.

Ukraine Is in Revolt; Troops Hoist Red Flag

Stockholm, Oct. 7.—Insurrection is spreading in the Ukraine and recently extended throughout the government of Podona, according to dispatches received by the Politburo. At several places, it is reported, the German troops are aiding with the rebels. Several thousand troops are declared to have hoisted the red flag near Eskaterinostav and to have killed their officers. They now are marching on Kharkov to join the revolutionary soldiers who hold the town. A peasant force of 5000 men, well armed with machine guns and cannon, is moving on Poltava.
