CATCH NEGRO AS HE LOOTS STORE

May Be the Same One Who Stole From Other Stores in Town

Some time last night, between 10 and 11 o'clock, people passing by the grocery store of Zimmerman, in Second street near Walnut, noticed a negro acting suspiciously. A watch was kept on him and a short time later the breaking of glass was heard, while the negro apparently made his escape down Second street. While the police were being notified, a noise was heard in the store and a match struck near the cash register. Linds Röhner, the ice cream manufacturer, guarded the only exit of the store. Officer Baurnmeister arrived, who entered the store and caught the negro. Apparently the negro who was caught had a companion, and the police are making an effort to catch him also.

Council Does but Little Business in Short Session

But little work was done at the session of town council last night. Resolutions of thanks were passed to the state and borough health department for an excellent work done during the influenza epidemic, and a letter from from Captain Richard C. Batley, who had charge of the hospital here, was read in which he thanked the local authorities for the help given by the officials of the town. The close desalons during the epidemic showed results in less arrests and consequently less fines for drunkenness and disorderly conduct. The fines amounted to only \$58.10, an amount far below the usual amount of fines.

[Continued from First Page.] before several months and then it will require twenty-two months for their transportation.

But hundreds who heard these words, at the same time heard from the Y. M. C. A. workers of the urgent need of the United War Work Fund, and took encouragement in the assurance of the speakers that until they return home, the boys overseas and in camps will be well supplied with comforts, recreation, and uplifting influences, if the people at home do their part. It is felt by workers here that the meeting is a great impetus to the home canvass which began in the city this morning.

Work Is Explained

Representatives of the seven war relief organizations gave a demonstration in an overseas hut of the work that will be accomplished among the soldiers until their return home. A detachment of soldiers from Middletown played the part of the Yankees, and were made comfortable and happy in the huts, while the secretaries explained the methods of accomplishing their work among men.

French First Home

When the armies finally begin to move back from the lines, he said, those which have been in the field longest will move first. The movement to the French army from the front first took up the railway facilities indefinitely, he said, and after them would go the English. With the English would be the New Zealanders, Australians, the great Canadian armies, and other territorial. All of the British shipment would be involved in this great re-advance, and following that, it would be used to build up England's ante-bellum maritime trade, which was allowed to languish during the transportation of the American troops to France.

Soldiers Trust 'Y' Men With No Questions

The captain in charge of a field hospital beyond Chateau-Thierry said that the 'Y' M. C. A. man at his door. They had never seen each other before.
