HUNS PLAN SWIFT PLANE FOR CROSSING ATLANTIC

Transoceanic Zeppelin, Capable of Carrying One Hundred Passengers and to Make the Trip in Forty Hours, Now Being Built; Trial Journey Next July

London, Dec. 6.—The Germans are building an airplane with which they intend trying a trip across the Atlantic, and have a Zeppelin under construction with the same idea in view, according to the correspondent at Berlin of the Daily Express. The airplane, being constructed at Staaken, has a wing spread of 193 feet and engines of 3,000 horsepower, the correspondent says. Almost immediately after the armistice was signed the Staaken plant began converting fighting planes on hand into commercial machines intended to link all the European capitals with Berlin, and dozens of planes built entirely of aluminum are being transformed for postal service.
