

OF 432 KILLED IN ACTION 42 STATE MEN YIELD LIVES

Death in Battle of Corporal David M. Thornton Reported by Pershing

Washington, Dec. 10.—The names in the casualty lists given out by the War Department today totals 3,194, of the 432 killed in action, 42 were Pennsylvanians. The summary follows:
