Washington, Jan. 6.—A total of 1,241 casualties is reported by the War Department for to-day and Sunday. Two hundred and ninety-three are reported for Sunday, and 1,221 to-day, all of Sunday's casualties being listed as "wounded severely."



Many Thrift Stamps Sold by Metropolitan

The total sales of War Saving Stamps by the Metropolitan agencies established during the war have been \$263,956, according to the report just issued by John Heathcote, in charge of enabling the clubs. Mr. Heathcote's report shows a number of local firms to have taken leading places in the sale of war stamps. The report follows:

London, Jan. 6.—There is considerable uneasiness in insurance circles with regard to Ignac Paderewski, who is considered an unenviable risk since he became embroiled in the fierce political maelstrom in Poland.

Each of his fingers is said to be individually insured for a very large sum against any accident or violence that might interfere with his execution on the piano. This is carried to such extremes that some of the policies hold the insurers liable even for the breaking of a nail.
