**316TH INFANTRY IS PRAISED FOR VALOR IN BATTLE**

Dauphin County Drafted Men Win Citation From Commander

The great number of selective service men from this vicinity who are in the Three Hundred and Sixty-sixth Infantry, Seventy-ninth Division, are given high praise in an official commendation issued by Major General Joseph H. Kuhn, commanding the division. He says:

"Headquarters 79th Division, 'A. M. E. F. France, 27th November, 1918.

"From: Commanding General; To: C. O. 316th Infantry, through C. O. 168th Infantry Brigade; Subject: Commendation of Regiment.

"1. In the final offensive on the heights east of the Meuse and north of Verdun the task of breaking the enemy's resistance at the Borne du Cornouiller (Hill 378) devolved upon the Three Hundred and Sixty-sixth Regiment of infantry. Stubbornly defended by the enemy, this tactically strong point presented an obstacle of the most serious character. In spite of difficult conditions the regiment succeeded after three days' heavy fighting, November 4 to 6, in capturing and finally holding the Borne du Cornouiller, in breaking the enemy's resistance and contributing materially to driving the enemy from the heights east of the Meuse a few days later.

"2. Numerous authenticated instances of gallantry, tenacity and endurance have come to the Commanding General's notice, proving beyond question that the regiment acquitted itself with the greatest credit and in a manner worthy of the best American traditions.

"3. The commanding general takes great pride in the achievements of the regiment and directs that you bring this letter to the attention of your command.

"Headquarters 168th Infantry Brigade, American E. F. France, 28 November, 1918. To commanding officer, 316th Infantry.

"1. Transmitted. It is with pleasure that the brigade commander transmits his well-earned letter of commendation from the division commander. Now that the immediate fighting would appear to be over, it should be an incentive to every officer and soldier of the 316th Infantry to maintain under existing conditions, by its appearance, training and discipline, the high standard gained on the field of battle.

"Headquarters 316th Infantry, A. E. F., 29 November, 1918. To all battalion commanders and commanding officers of headquarters companies, machine gun company, supply company and sanitary detachment.

"1. The present commanding officer of the 316th Infantry is pleased in transmitting this letter of commendation from the commanding general, together with the endorsement of commendation added by the brigade commander to the members of the command. He congratulates Colonel George Williams and Lieutenant-Colonel George E. Haedicke, who successively commanded the regiment at the Borne du Cornouiller and all the officers and men who participated in the combat of November 4 to 6, on the excellent work they performed at that time and on the splendid name they won for the regiment. The high standard set in combat will be the standard aimed at in training for combat.

"2. Battalion commanders and commanders of separate units will read this letter with the attached endorsement of headquarters units at first formation after receipt.

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**\$945,000 PLACED TO BOOM YANKEE TRADE OVERSEAS**

Big Budget to Defray Legislative, Executive and Judicial Expenses Goes In

Washington, Jan. 10.—Aid in the extension of American foreign trade is provided in the annual legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill for 1920 reported to-day to the House. The measure carries appropriations totalling \$96,318,000, approximately \$7,000,000 more than the 1919 bill and provides for 19,435 salaries a decrease of 178.

Trade Budget Doubled

For the expansion of America's title of counselor of the department

foreign trade an appropriation of \$945,000 would be given the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce of the Department of Commerce. The appropriation, which is double that made in 1919, contemplates, according to testimony given at hearings on the bill, the sending of agents of the bureau throughout the world to investigate opportunities for American business. The home personnel of the bureau also is increased under the bill so that information as to world markets may be readily available to American businessmen.

Aid For Nation's Firms

Assistance also would be given American firms engaging in foreign trade through the State Department, additions being provided for the department's staff of trade advisers and legal experts. Representatives of the State Department at hearings on the bill urged that measures be taken to insure that American businessmen are treated fairly by foreign governments in the competition for after-the-war trade.

In providing for State Department needs the bill abolishes the office of counselor of the department

and substitutes the title of under secretary of state.

Money to Aid Census Bureau

The increase in appropriations carried by the bill is due largely to provisions for the 1920 census, the amount proposed for that purpose being \$12,060,700. The other principal increase is an addition of \$2,228,000 over the 1919 appropriation for the internal revenue bureau.

Reductions from the 1919 bill consist mainly in elimination of many positions created during the war, more than six millions of dollars being cut from the War, Navy and State Departments' payrolls. Contingent expense funds of various departments were cut several hundred thousand dollars, while military research work by the Bureau of Standards is eliminated at a saving of \$460,000.

Discontinuance of the subtreasuries at Baltimore, Boston, New York, Philadelphia and five other cities also reduced the appropriations by \$463,000. Development of the federal reserve system, in the opinion of the House appropriations subcommittee, has eliminated the

necessity of maintaining the sub-treasuries.

**Dr. Patton Tells of Democracy in the War**

The Rev. Francis L. Patton, former president of Princeton, paid tribute in glowing terms to the spirit of democracy shown between the French, English, Italians and Americans during the recent war, in the fourth of a series of lectures delivered in the Pine Street Presbyterian Church last night. He commended warmly the spirit of brotherhood existing between these soldiers and explained that it was a great factor in the successful termination of the great conflict.

"For democracy three fundamentals are needed," he continued, touching on his subject, "War and Democracy." First, education; second, moral purpose, and third, public opinion and free press. There are various kinds of democracy. First, the kind that has a king for the ruler, second, a president with limited power, and last a president who holds a vast amount of power and holds his position for only four years.

"We Americans shall soon see a League of Nations with the United States, Great Britain, France and Italy as the backbone," he prophesied.
