My Advertising Man Insists that I Publish This Letter

Last Wednesday, January 8th I wrote my advertising man outlining some ideas I wanted incorporated in my publicity. He wrote back — "Publish that letter you wrote me — that's better advertising than I can give you." So here's the letter, or the advertising part of it, reproduced verbatim.

Dear Mr. Fehlman: I wish you and Mr. Barrett would get your heads together and send me a few clever ads. Something exciting and to the point. For instance, some women are so thoughtless, if I may so term it, that when going to shop they will say to themselves—"Well, I would go in Mary Sachs' shop this season, but I only intend to spend \$50.00 for a coat." Somehow, they go to the cheapest houses in Harrisburg, a concern that sells coats for \$10.00 to \$50.00 and they are willing to pay \$50.00 for one of their coats.

Now, my \$50.00 garments are made by the same house that makes my \$200.00 garments. They represent the same tailoring and details of high-class merchandise and we show as much consideration to the customer who buys the \$50.00 garment as to the one who buys the \$200.00 garment. And yet, this class of people will not come in my store because they think I am high priced. I want to be very emphatic in my talk and tell them that I know I am selling merchandise closer than any other merchant in Harrisburg.

I am trying to build the foundation of my business with but one thought in mind and that is, that when customers go out of my establishment, and compare their purchases with those of others, I want my merchandise to exceed in quality and at less cost. This is the one thing that is going to establish my trade for the coming season.

And in one of my ads, I want to invite a little trouble by urging the people to come back with their complaints. While I claim that I have efficient help and know what I am about, I know we are not infallible and I don't want anyone to feel that the garment they purchased, did not come up to their expectations.
