

BAKER'S ENGINE FAILS ON FINAL TRIP IN FRANCE

Drops Rapidly, Starts Vrille and Crashes; Almost Instantly Killed

Princeton, N. J., Jan. 23.—The first detailed account of how Captain Hobart A. H. Baker, former Princeton athlete, met his death in France 45 minutes after his release from service, has just been received in a letter from Lieutenant Edward C. Olds, who was adjutant on the staff of the second army air service to which Captain Baker belonged.

Captain Baker was killed near Toul on December 31. Lieutenant Olds wrote that after being released Baker decided to take a final short trip in his spud. "There was a ship in his hangar belonging to one of his officers, the engine of which had gone bad a few days ago," the letter said. "It had been repaired and Captain Baker decided to use his last trip to test out the repaired machine. Both his officer and mechanics strongly urged him not to do so but he insisted. He was up only 150 metres when the engine failed. He dropped rapidly and, if he had continued straight ahead, would have landed in some

small trees and wires. However, he did what so many good aviators do just once too often—he tried to get back into the field, nosed down to gain headway, started into a vrille and crashed, being almost instantly killed.

"He was buried near Major Lufberry, in the little American cemetery of United States evacuation hospital No. 1 at Menil-La-Tour, just north of Toul."

BROKEN RAIL WRECKS OFFICIAL TRAIN ON P. R. R.

Special From Philadelphia to Pittsburg Is Derailed Near Altoona

Altoona, Jan. 23.—Pennsylvania railroad officials are to-day making an investigation as to who is responsible for the wreck of the special train at Mineral Point, on the Pittsburgh division, just west of here, late yesterday afternoon. The train was wrecked by a broken rail. Just how long the rail had been there without being reported is being looked into.

Three men were injured, one perhaps seriously. The train was conveying Superintendent R. T. Morrow, of the Pittsburgh division, and a party of officials from Philadelphia to Pittsburgh.

The locomotive went over a fifteen-foot embankment. Engineer J. Phillips, of Pittsburgh, suffered severe injuries and was taken to a Johnstown hospital. The fireman and Assistant Passenger Trainmaster Almond, Pittsburgh, were also hurt. One of three special coaches occupied by the officials went partly over-

GERMANY'S VOTERS PIN THEIR FAITH TO THE SOCIALISTS

Give Majority Faction 160 Seats and Minority 23; Kurt Eisner, Bavarian Premier, Fails to Win at Polls; Christian People's Party Captures Eighty Places

By Associated Press Basle, Switzerland, Jan. 23.—Reports from all the twenty-seven electoral districts in Germany, returning the full number of 421 members of the national assembly, show the Majority Socialists having a plurality in the assembly, with 164 votes. The next highest number of members was returned by the Christian peoples' party, the former Centrists, who will have 88 members. The distribution of the members by parties is:

Majority Socialists, 164; Christian People's party, 88; Democrats, 77; German National party, 34; Minority Socialists, 24; German People's party, 23; Guelphs, 4; Bavarian Peasants' League, 4; Wurtemberg Bourgeois party, 2; Peasants and Workers' Democratic League, 1. Total, 421.

KRUPP PLANT IS MAKING GUNS TO SUIT U. S.

Completing Parts of Cannon Rejected Under Terms of Armistice

Coblenz, Jan. 23.—The Krupp plant at Essen began working for the United States government Tuesday. The task undertaken by the Krupps consists of making parts for seventy-two incomplete cannon, rejected by the American authorities as part of the war material offered by the Germans under the terms of the armistice.

The German commission which has been in Berlin considering the question of the heavy guns turned down by the American authorities has arrived at Coblenz and reported that eighty cannon have been shipped to the headquarters of the American army of occupation to replace big guns which failed to meet requirements. With the delivery of the parts for the seventy-two cannon and the arrival of these eighty cannon, the delivery of heavy artillery to the Americans will have

been completed, the American allotment calling for one hundred and fifty-two heavy guns.
