London, Feb. 6.—The government to-day was still maintaining its attitude that it could not interfere in the strikes now in progress, for the reason that they were solely industrial controversies, but the great inconvenience the London public is suffering has prompted the government to undertake measures of relief until a settlement is reached.

General Strike Starts This Morning in Seattle

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 6.—Seattle's general strike was called at the scheduled time 10 a. m. to-day. First reports from the downtown section stated union street carmen started their car for the barns at 10 o'clock; union elevator operators in all the large buildings abandoned their cars and restaurants closed their doors when their union cooks and waiters left.

FARM LANDS OF KEYSTONE STATE ARE MOST FERTILE IN ENTIRE UNITED STATES

Pennsylvania's farms yielded \$11.45 per acre more than any other state, according to statistics of Bureau of Crop Estimates Pennsylvania's acres used for agricultural purposes produced a yield of \$43.77 per acre during the past year as compared with an average yield of \$32.32 for the remainder of the United States. Pennsylvania's acreage is 3.056 per cent. of the total acreage of the country, but the net value of her products was 4.14 per cent.
