Fire Causes Heavy Loss on Altoona and Northern

Fire that originated in the oil shed yesterday morning destroyed the enginehouse and car repair shop of the Altoona and Northern Railroad Company, located in Logan township, just west of Juniata, causing a loss of between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

There were two locomotives in the enginehouse when the fire broke out and one under steam outside. The latter was hooked to one of those engines and it was taken out undamaged, but the other was under repairs and was jacked up, so that it was impossible to haul it out, and it stood through the fire and was completely ruined.

Slight Blaze Causes Much Smoke at Pennsy Station

A slight fire in one of the lockers on the third floor of the Pennsylvania railroad passenger station caused considerable excitement late yesterday afternoon. Considerable smoke increased the excitement, but the blaze was gotten under control by railroad firemen before much damage was done.
