Washington, March 12.—Casualty lists issued today by the War Department contain a total of 272 names, 30 of which are on a Marine Corps list. ENGINEERING DIVISIONS MADE

Chief Engineer Uhler Announces the Plan For the State Road Building

Col. William D. Uhler, chief engineer of the State Highway Department today announced the divisions and engineers of the State in the big road building program. There are few changes.

"The Engineering Division," said Colonel Uhler "is prepared to hold up its end in the campaign planned to give Pennsylvania the greatest highway system in America."



France Abandons Hope of the Allies Sharing War Debt

Paris, March 12. — France has abandoned for the present at least any hope of having her great war debt shared by the allies. It is authoritatively asserted by one of the Americans attending the conference that what had been an embarrassing possibility has now been definitely eliminated from the deliberations, although it is possible that France might at some future time attempt to secure assistance. The project has never been formally presented at the conference, but conversations held at intervals since the conference began have served as a medium for the presentation of the French point of view. The British and American delegations have been quite frank in their disapproval and have openly said that the people of their countries would be slow to endorse such a plan.

Bolsheviks Destroy Vistavka, but the Allies Still Hold It

Archangel, March 12. — Operating ten guns the Bolshevik forces on Monday shelled the village of Vistavka, on the Vaga, almost completely destroying it. Repeated heavy infantry attacks followed, but these were repulsed, with heavy losses by the American, British and Russians. The Allies were greatly outnumbered, but fought bravely in the snow. The Allied troops yesterday morning still occupied the ruins of Vistavka and were ready for new attacks.
