

WAR SECRETS TO BE TOLD TO COMMERCE BODY

Chemical Auxiliaries of the Fighting Forces to Be Explained by Gov't Expert

DO YOU KNOW That a ship lost in a fog can be located by land stations using a radio compass? That a big gun may be located within fifty yards by the discharge with instruments ten miles away? That aircraft 10,000 feet in the air can talk to each other and to the ground by wireless telephone? That messages can be sent from a submarine 150 feet under the ocean?

Dr. E. A. Eckhardt, of the Bureau of Standards, at Washington, who will address the Harrisburg Chamber of Commerce luncheon meeting in the Penn-Harris ballroom Tuesday afternoon, will explain some of the marvels of modern warfare which were developed in Washington to assist the army and navy during the war. When the announcement was made that the War Department had lifted the censorship ban which surrounded the secrets of the Bureau of Standards during hostilities, officials of the Chamber lost no time in securing a speaker to address a luncheon meeting of the wonders of the inventions which have been credited widely with having taken a great part in the successful prosecution of the war.

Twenty-One Bids For One Armory

Twenty-one bids for construction of the cavalry armory at Philadelphia were opened at the office of the State Armory Board today and an award will be made Tuesday. Tomorrow bids will be opened for the Reading and Tyrone armories. The lowest bid for the cavalry armory was made by George F. Hawling & Co., Philadelphia, at \$215,000, the Standard Construction Co., Philadelphia, being next with \$239,850. Ten bids were made for the Pottstown armory, the lowest being at \$9,523, offered by the Heating System, J. H. Hutchinson, Philadelphia, being low at \$12,125. F. H. Keiser, Pottstown, bid low on the Pottstown armory repairs at \$2,421 and W. H. Jones, West Chester, was low on West Chester armory repairs at \$4,600.

Governor Sproul today announced approval of the Senate bill valuing real estate in Pennsylvania to pay a portion of the cost of improvement of borough highways for several measures carrying delinquent appropriations for counties. The deficits included Harrisburg State Hospital, \$45,000; Spring City Institution, \$80,000; Scranton State Hospital, \$45,000; Polk Institution, \$48,000; Parvise State Institution, \$50,000.

The Governor also signed the bill extending authority to boroughs and incorporated towns to refund moneys paid by property owners when courts find that there was no liability. Complaint was filed at the Public Safety Commission today by Representative McClellan, of Selma, against grade crossing of the Pennsylvania railroad in that town. The complaint states that one crossing has "a list of casualties" and is without protection. The State Highway Department announced today that awards of contracts for which bids were opened yesterday would be made in a few days. The bids are being checked up.

Further, the motion picture sold more Liberty Bonds, raised more money for the Red Cross, did more for the food administration than any other instrument of publicity."
