

WALSH REFUTES ARGUMENT OF BRITISH CONTROL

Montana Senator Says England Would Have One Vote in League

Washington, March 26.—Senator Walsh, of Montana, speaking here last night under the auspices of the National American Woman's Suffrage Association, declared that the proposed constitution for a League of Nations does not conflict with the Monroe Doctrine, but makes possible universal application of its principles. The concessions that the United States might be called upon to make in joining a League of Nations, Senator Walsh said, would be far outweighed by the benefits to be derived from its operation and urged support of the proposed covenant. The fact that Great Britain would have but one vote in the executive council of the league was cited by

the Montana Senator as refuting the argument that the British empire would be able to dominate the league's action. He emphasized also that a unanimous vote of the council was necessary to recommend concerted military action by the member states.

School Teachers to Resign if Woodward Bill Fails

Pittsburgh, March 26.—Resignations of at least a third of Pittsburgh's public school teachers is declared possible if opposition to the Woodward bill to increase teachers pay throughout the state develops to a menacing point. "If the reported opposition to this bill proves strong, it will bring about a serious opposition in the Pittsburgh schools," John H. Adams, president of the Teachers Association, said. "The teachers are working to secure higher pay. If this is not granted, individual action will be taken; that is, a great many will be compelled to resign and get work that pays a living wage. This is not a holdup of the teachers as a body," said Mr. Adams, "but it means that individuals will be driven into a corner and may act in a manner disastrous to the educational interests."

ABOLISHES POST OF FRENCH HIGH COMMISSIONER

French Departments at Washington Will Look After the Work

Paris, March 26.—President Poincaré, acting on Captain Andre Tardieu's suggestion, has signed a decree abolishing the post of French high commissioner at Washington on April 1. That part of the organization which must be maintained in the United States several months longer will be placed under the direct authority of various French departments. Jean Maurice Casenave, charge at the French embassy at Washington, will be appointed general director in the United States. The Department of Franco-American war co-operation, created in June, 1918, will be maintained with its present functions until after the departure of the American army.

FLATLY DENIES HIS DEATH; ERROR MADE IN SHIPPING BODY

Allentown, Pa., March 26.—Edwin Hamman, retired cigar manufacturer, of Emaus, and for twenty-one years superintendent of the Moravian Sunday school at that place, telegraphed yesterday to members of his family that he was not only alive and well, but that he never felt better in his life, notwithstanding the fact that a coffin, appropriately marked with a silver plate, on which his name and age were engraved, and purporting to contain his remains, had been sent to his former home from the Masonic Homes at Elizabethtown, of which institution he has been an inmate for two months. Members of the family on Sunday night received a telegram from the Masonic Homes officials announcing the death of Hamman, with the information that the body would be shipped at once to Emaus. Local newspapers yesterday printed long obituary notices of Hamman, with appropriate eulogy. Late in the afternoon a body arrived at Emaus, as per schedule, but when the lid of the coffin was removed it at once became apparent that a mistake had been made, for the body in the casket bore no resemblance whatever to the former Emaus man. The Masonic Homes was then called on the telephone, and it was explained that the error occurred through the fact that two bodies had been shipped from the home at the same time. Later, however, it was discovered that Hamman was not dead at all, and that an error had been made in marking the coffin that contained the remains of another inmate. The Hamman family and the local Masonic bodies, which had already begun elaborate arrangements for the funeral, thereupon canceled the program.

MARTIAL LAW IS IN FORCE IN SPAIN RESULT OF STRIKE

Government Agrees to Withdraw Resignation Because of Unrest

Madrid, March 26.—The Spanish government has agreed to withdraw its resignation owing to the general strike in Barcelona and has proclaimed martial law throughout Spain. Troops are now occupying the chief streets of Barcelona in order to insure the carrying out of the public services. The government is determined to exercise energetic measures to re-establish order, and as a result the concessions offered by it to the strikers have been slight. London, March 26.—Constitutional guarantees have been suspended

throughout Spain, a Central News dispatch from Madrid says. The Spanish government has exhausted its efforts at conciliation and, the dispatch adds, is determined to act firmly to maintain order. 

York Merchants Vote to Close Stores Saturday Evenings

"Almost unanimous approval is given by merchants of the city in the matter of closing their places of business Saturday nights, in a referendum ballot just taken. At a council meeting of the retail merchants' bureau of the York Chamber of Commerce, held in the Lehmyer Building this morning, action was taken to carry the innovation into effect, beginning Saturday, May 3. The stores will close at 6 P. M. This closing schedule will not affect such place of business as cigar, confectionery and drug stores, which do a big percentage of their business on Saturday nights."—York Dispatch.

"York Typographical Union has endorsed the movement of the retail merchants to close the stores on Saturday at 6 P. M. The argument is advanced that any movement tending to reduce the hours of labor for any employees, whether organized or not should have the support of any organized body."—York Dispatch. 
