

State Department Looks Into the New Mexican Oil Order

Washington, March 26.—Officials of the State Department have begun a study of the order of the Department of Industry at Mexico City threatening to punish foreign companies and individuals for drilling wells or doing other petroleum development work without permission of the Federal government.

Philadelphia, March 26.—The Pennsylvania Railroad Company held its annual election here and re-elected George Wood, C. Stuart Patterson and Clement B. Newbold as directors to serve for the term of four years.

ENTIRE EGYPT NOW IN REVOLT

Churchill Tells Commons Insurrection Has Spread Over the Country

London, March 26.—Defending the military service bill in the House of Commons yesterday, Winston Spencer Churchill, Secretary for War, declared that the whole of Egypt was now in a state of insurrection. The position was so uncertain, he added, that the government had to appeal to men on the point of demobilization to return and fight the Egyptian comrades from being murdered.

NEWS FLAMES OFF THE OCEAN CABLES

London.—The miners' conference has decided to recommend to its members that they accept the Sankey report for the settlement of the miners' demands on the government and that a ballot be taken on the question.

Madrid.—The government has issued a decree establishing an eight-hour-day in the building trades here.

Paris.—It was learned last night that the government had opened an inquiry into the manner in which the French press had been enabled to keep so closely in touch with the doings of the Supreme Council.

London.—The troops of the Kolchak government who pierced Bolshevist front on a thirty-mile sector on March 11, continue their progress and the position of the Bolsheviki is precarious, according to a Reuter dispatch from Omsk.

Dublin.—The executive committee of the Sinn Fein party issued an official statement late Tuesday night, announcing that the public reception planned for Professor Edward De Valera, who had been in an English prison for some time and who escaped on February 4, has been abandoned.

PROTEST AGAINST ALLEGHENY. County authorities of Allegheny, Mercer and Beaver to-day entered protest before Governor William C. Sproul against the bill proposing to make payable to the State half of the personal property tax, contending that it would not only decrease revenues, but also cut down borrowing capacity.

HENRY F. MILLER. Funeral services for Henry F. Miller, who died Monday at his home, 70 North Thirteenth street, will be held to-morrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, the Rev. William M. Moses, pastor of St. Paul's Methodist Church, officiating. Burial will be made in the East Harrisburg cemetery. Mr. Miller was a member of St. Paul's Church for more than forty-five years and was active and prominent in its work for many years.

Germany Cleaves to Wilson

Germany is determined to stick close to the Wilson program in making peace with the allies, Count Von Bernstorff former German ambassador to the United States, declared in an interview last night given the Berlin correspondent of the Temps, which that newspaper prints to-day.

ASSASSINS SLAY FORMER PREMIER

Hungary, has been arrested and will be brought before a revolutionary tribunal for trial, a Vienna dispatch to the National Tidens of Copenhagen says.

Berlin, March 26.—It is reported from Vienna that communication between Vienna and Budapest has been interrupted through the capture by the Czech-Slovaks of the town of Raab, on the Danube about midway between the two cities. Large Hungarian cannon foundries are situated at Raab.
