

BELGIANS WILL VISIT U. S. AND PARADE CITIES

Special Corps Under Major Dirix Will See All Big Towns

Brussels, March 28.—A special corps of Belgian soldiers, at the invitation of the United States government, will visit the United States to take part in parades in the principal cities. The corps will be composed of a platoon of grenadiers, one of chasseurs and one of infantrymen, and will be under the command of Major Dirix.

Just how long the Belgian soldiers will remain in America is not known here, nor is it known as to just what festivities they will take part in. It is believed they will visit practically all of the big cities in the country before their return home. Whether they will be in the States in time for the Victory Loan campaign is not known.

Jams, Jellies and Canned Fruits Needed by Hospital

Heretofore this has been an annual job for the Guild, but on account of the war this task was eliminated last year, consequently the supply of jellies is now very low. By economical means it is believed that the present supply can be stretched until the preserving season.

As the list of persons who have made contributions of this kind in years gone by had been lost, the committee in charge will have its hands full this year, but by sending its names and addresses to the home of the chairman the amount of work will be greatly lessened.
