

SPORTSMEN SAY NEW ACT WOULD STOP FISHING

Lykens and Wiconisco Association Up in Arms Against Alleged "Joker"

Officials of the Lykens and Wiconisco Fish and Game Protective Association, are conducting an active campaign to bring about the removal of what they term "joker" in the amendment to the trespass law of April, 1905, which they believe would eliminate much of the fishing and hunting throughout the State.

"It shall not be lawful or legal, the amendment says, 'for any person to trespass upon wild or undeveloped lands within a half mile of any open stream, the water from which is used for domestic purposes by the public generally if such lands are posted as provided for in this act.' This amendment would operate to permit fishing and hunting at only a few places, the sportsmen say.

J. Allen Barrett, secretary of the association, has issued the following statement to members:

"In a letter dated March 22, 1919, addressed to various sportsmen's associations throughout the State, I called attention to a certain amend-


ment which was drawn up amending the trespass law of April, 1905. An amendment making it lawful and legal for persons to trespass upon wild and undeveloped lands during the open seasons for hunting and fishing notwithstanding such lands be posted as provided for in this act. I sent a copy of that letter to all parts of the State and was very much impressed with its acceptance. Judging from the replies I feel safe in saying, there is not an association in the State which does not approve of our action. We have caused to be created a State-wide organization of approximately 500,000 sportsmen acting in one accord, who have pledged themselves body and soul to be back of this movement. The sportsmen of the entire State of Pennsylvania are up in arms. They are anxious to see this excellent piece of legislation go through, but they are more so interested in seeing it go through clean.

The amendment was drawn up exactly as stated above and was introduced into the House of Representatives by Representative Cyrus M. Palmer, of Schuylkill county. However, when it appeared out of the committee and went into print it was noticed that a radical and very unfair clause had been inserted by some one the identification with whom I am not familiar, nevertheless it is there and must be extracted. If this act is to go through and become a law the way it now reads, it will be far more severe than the original trespass law. The clause or "joker" as we might call it, and which was inserted reads as follows: "It shall not be lawful or legal for any person to trespass upon wild or undeveloped lands within a half-mile of any open stream the water from which is used for domestic purposes by the public generally if such lands are posted as provided for in this act." Look it over carefully and I know that you will agree with the importance of removing this quick action. The sportsmen of this State are not in sympathy with any legislation of this kind and will lose no time in putting forth the effort which will bring about the original amendment.

New for a line of defense—immediately notify your Representatives and Senators, either by letter, wire or personally, but do so at once. Request him to use all his influence and prestige to remove this "joker" and have the bill go through right. We are in this to win and will stay to the last trench. With

Col. Jennings' Old Regiment to Meet

May 3, in Harrisburg, will be a notable day for those gallant and rapidly disappearing heroes of the Civil War veterans, which, identified with the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers, will make the Penn-Harris State, which is largely due to the tireless efforts of the efficient secretary of the game commission, and his good work should not be permitting hunters to enter upon the wild lands of the State. APPOINTED RURAL CARRIER



TO COLLECT TAXES


