

# ONE DEAD AND MANY HURT IN MAY DAY FETES

Most Serious Rioting Occurs in Cleveland and Boston

 New York, May 2.—Comparatively little bloodshed marked radical celebrations in the United States of International Labor Day. The most serious rioting occurred in Cleveland where one man was killed and more than 100 persons, including eleven policemen, were injured. Next in importance was a battle between the police and paraders in Boston during which three patrolmen were shot and another stabbed and many arrests made.  
 The riot call was sounded in Chicago when radicals attempted to hold a parade which had been forbidden. Several persons were arrested but there were no casualties.  
 Soldiers and sailors in this city broke up several meetings at which Ultra-liberal sentiments were expressed and also raided the offices of the Call, a Socialist labor newspaper. They made no attempt to wreck the publishing plant but destroyed a large quantity of Socialist literature and roughly handled a dozen employees of the paper. A small army of service men tried persistently last night to break up a meeting at Madison Square Garden, but were beaten off by 1,200 patrolmen mobilized around the building. Scores of men in uniform were beaten with night sticks.

**Red Plans Miscarried**  
 Red plans for the most gruesome May Day tragedy in history miscarried because of the accidental discovery of the bomb plot which had nationwide ramifications. None of the score and more of infernal machines entrusted to the mails has claimed its intended victim.

Explosive experts contend that the bombs were powerful enough to blow a man to pieces but only one person has been seriously injured by the deadly devices. That was a negro janitor employed by former Senator Hardwick. Three more of the dynamite filled packages were found in the mails to-day. These were addressed to Senator Overman, who conducted the Senate investigation into disloyalty, to Senator William H. King, of Utah, and to Frank K. Nebeker, of Salt Lake City, assistant attorney general, who was a special prosecutor during the I. W. W. trial in Chicago. Another addressed to Senator Smoot, of Utah, is known to have been mailed but has not been traced.

New York apparently was the center of the plot, but no arrests have been made thus far although scores of agents of the Department of Justice, post office inspectors and detectives have scoured the city for some promising clew. The haunts of Reds and radicals have been carefully watched but the chief hope of success in the chase rested in the possibility of finding on the bombs finger prints which may correspond with those of anarchists and radicals who have been arrested at some time or other.

## 2,000 Businessmen in Pittsburgh Acclaim Wood Next President

Pittsburgh, Pa., May 2.—More than 2,000 businessmen of Pittsburgh gave their approval of General Leonard Wood as a candidate for President of the United States here yesterday, when General Wood, Senator Knox and Admiral William S. Sims appeared to speak for the Victory Liberty Loan in the Chamber of Commerce auditorium. The auditorium was packed to overflowing. The overflow adjourned to other rooms and even then it was found necessary to hold a third overflow meeting.

The audience was howlingly enthusiastic. Admiral Sims was first to file into the auditorium, followed by Senator Knox. Then came General Wood.  
 "Wood for President," the crowd yelled as the general appeared in his khaki uniform.  
 "Rah for Wood, for our next President," this was another unanimous yell from the crowd.  
 The general stood up, bowed and saluted. And still they yelled: "Wood for next President!"  
 When calm was finally brought about Admiral Sims was introduced. He first paid his respects to newspapermen. He said that during his entire course of the war not one American newspaperman had violated his trust to the United States and to the Army and Navy.  
 Admiral Sims warned the people against Bolshevism.  
 When General Wood was introduced the audience stood and howled.  
 "You're our next President!" one man yelled.  
 "Yes, Wood for President!" came a chorus.  
 The general refrained from any reply, but prefaced his remarks with the statement:  
 "For the short time I was permitted to be with the boys over there—"

Then there came a yell.  
 "You ought to have been sent there in the beginning!" one voice boomed.  
 "Yes, you were sidetracked, but you'll be our next President," came another voice.  
 "You bet," put in another. Then General Wood had to bow to another burst of applause.

## New Bookkeeper and \$25,000 Are Missing

New York, May 2.—Silas L. Stein, proprietor of a Brooklyn livery stable, reported to the police yesterday that a steel cabinet containing Liberty Bonds, diamonds and cash to the value of \$25,000 had been removed bodily from his safe.
