"War Beer" Will Be Manufactured Until Court Gives Decision
New York, May 24.—Uninterrupted production of "war beer" until the courts have passed upon the claim of the United States Brewers' Association that the beverage, containing 2 3/4 per cent alcohol, is non-intoxicating, was assured yesterday when Federal Judge Mayer granted an injunction restraining Government interference with its manufacture. The court declared that his de-

cision had been influenced by President Wilson's message to Congress, recommending repeal of the war-time prohibition act, insofar as it relates to beer and wine, and by Federal Judge A. N. Hand's ruling, last week that the law placed a ban on the manufacture only of liquors that were, in fact, intoxicating.

JAIL IN HIS BACK YARD, BUT HE HATES IT NOW
Beloit, Wis.—James Root, who has been chief of police of South Beloit for two years, has a perfectly good jail on his hands, but no authority to put any

one into it. When he was elected chief Mr. Root built the village hoosegow on the back end of the lot on which his home stands. Both Houses Get Another Batch of Bills
Washington, May 24.—Bills and resolutions almost equal in number to those presented last Monday, when Congress convened were introduced to-day in the Senate. Senate officials estimated that nearly 400 were introduced yesterday.

A bill similar to one recently presented in the House, by Representative Campbell, of Pennsylvania, providing for the distribution among the states, of captured war trophies, was introduced by Senator Wadsworth, of New York.

A joint resolution praising the services rendered during the war, by Miss Evangeline Booth, commander of the Salvation Army, and conferring upon her the honorary rank of colonel was offered by Senator Watson, of Indiana. It was referred to the Military Committee.

FAMOUS TEMPLES OF JAPAN ARE IN RUINS
Tokyo.—Egypt built her monuments in stone; Japan built most of hers of wood. The Egyptian pyramids were thousands of years old when Kamakura was built. To-day the pyramids seem no older, but Kamakura's greatness is only a memory. A few temples built from wood, after fire and tidal waves had destroyed the city, are all that have remained, and they are fragile temples of wood.

In one temple the image is a Japanese conception of the god of the lower world. The figure has an unusual history. An image maker, it is said, died. When he appeared before the lord of the other world, he was told that in his lifetime he had never represented the lord of the world properly, and that he must return to earth and make a correct likeness. The figure is pointed out as the result of the order.

The most remarkable image in Kamakura is not in a temple. It is the well-known Dai Butsu, or great Buddha, which sits alone in meditation with only the sky for a roof, and casual visitors and a priest in attendance. The grove which surrounds the Buddha seems dwarfed beside his giant proportions. The statue is said to measure fifty feet in height, the head alone being nine feet high. This giant Buddha is one of the relics of Kamakura's thirteenth century greatness. It has survived because it is made of bronze plates fashioned by the best metal workers in Japan. It is one of Japan's very few monuments that can aspire to rival in longevity the pyramids.
