

CITY HOSPITAL HAS BIG YEAR

More Cases Handled Than Ever Before at Big Institution

Statistical reports for the year, submitted to the Board of Managers of the Harrisburg Hospital in annual session yesterday, show an increase in the number of cases treated. The

increase of patients treated in wards and private rooms was 881 while the increase in number of those treated in the medical department was 839. The number of patients treated in the dispensary was 5,375, making the total 10,975.

The debt of the institution was reduced more than \$8,000 during the hospital year, which ended May 31. At that time the deficit was \$198,871, as compared with \$978,118 at the beginning of the year. The cost of treating influenza patients was \$11,888.84.
