A special musical program is in preparation by the new cantor.

There will be services to-morrow and Sunday. To-morrow the program will start at 8 o'clock in the morning and continue until noon. On Sunday the services will be held at the usual hour. Rabbi Kapitz will preach at the services to-morrow and Sunday.

Sims Made Grand Officer of the Legion of Honor

Washington, July 11.—Rear Admiral William S. Sims, who commanded American Naval forces in European waters during the war, was decorated with the rank and crossed a Grand Officer of the Legion of Honor yesterday at the Navy Department. Only two other American naval officers, Admirals Henry T. Mayo and William B. Wilson hold this rank in the Legion of Honor.

Lieutenant Commander James G. Ware, who commanded the American destroyer to put the game on ice in a battle with the German submarine U-56, near Brest, was made a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor.

New Steamship Line Between Denmark and Mexico Is Proposed

Mexico City, July 11.—N. F. Troncoso, Mexican charge d'affaires in Norway and Sweden, has informed the government here that he has arranged with a syndicate of Danish capitalists to establish a steamship line between Denmark and Mexico.

Naval Clemency Board Reviews Courts-Martial

Washington, July 11.—A clemency board, consisting of Secretary Daniels, Head Admiral George E. Clark, Judge Advocate General, and Commander Frank B. Freyer, Assistant Judge Advocate General, now is engaged in reviewing court-martial sentences imposed during the war.

Many punishments, involving prison terms or fines, are being mitigated or set aside by the reviewing board. The board found in many cases that punishment, while well deserved in time of war, might be regarded as too severe now that hostilities have ceased.

Secretary Daniels announced today that not a man was executed as the result of naval courts-martial during the war. In several cases, he said, courts-martial recommended the death penalty, but in each the reviewing board commuted the sentence to imprisonment.

WIND DOES DAMAGE

The most serious results of the high wind which accompanied the storm last evening were the unroofing of the house of John Ferber and the packing of the vicinity of Langiestown. Very little harm was done to the crops by the violent downpour and this was more than offset by the beneficial results of the rain, which came after several weeks of drought.

Lancaster, July 11.—Falling backward from a hayrack while loading, George Schaeffer, aged 57, a farmer of Nesville, had his neck broken and died instantly. The horses started forward unexpectedly and Schaeffer lost his balance.

MANY SAILORS CALLED Great Lakes, Ill., July 11.—Preparations were begun to-day at the naval training station here to dispatch four thousand sailors to sea within the next few days. The order of the Bureau of Navigation was received yesterday and the first contingent will be started for the Atlantic coast to-night. It was said that demobilization of reserves had thinned the ranks of the warships of the Atlantic and Pacific fleets and that the order was made "rush" to meet the urgent need for manpower.
