

IDLE RAILROAD AGAIN RUNNING

Susquehanna River and Western Now Operates Freight Trains Every Other Day

New Bloomfield, Pa. July 11.—After being idle to a large extent for the past several years, the Susquehanna River and Western Railroad has resumed partial operations. Freight trains are being run over the railroad now on alternate days, but no passenger schedule has been adopted.

All transfers of carload lots of freight from standard gauge cars to the narrow gauge cars of the Newport and Sherman's Valley Railroad and vice versa are now being made here instead of at Newport and the trains run from New Bloomfield to Duncannon, where they are transferred to the Pennsylvania railroad.

Persons in this vicinity regard the partial operation of the Susquehanna River and Western as a promising indication, after many rumors had been circulated that the railroad was to have been abandoned. With freight movements resumed on alternate days, they are becoming confident that passenger schedules will soon be adopted.

JAPANESE BANKS FORM SYNDICATE TO HELP CHINA

Take Action in Proposed Plan For Economic Development

Tokio, July 11.—Eighteen principal Japanese banks have organized a financial syndicate for the purpose of advancing a loan to China as a member of the proposed new four-power financial group. It is announced that the Yokohama Specie Bank will represent the banking syndicate in conducting negotiations with the financial syndicates of the three other powers, the United States, Great Britain and France.

The consortium of American, French, British and Japanese bankers was organized in Paris in May last at a meeting over which Thomas W. Lamont, of New York, presided.

Representatives of the so-called "Big Eight" investors in China, comprising the firms of Mitsui, Mitsubishi, Okura, Kuhara, Furukawa, Saito, Manchuria Railway, Sino-Japanese Trading Co., and the Eastern Asiatic Industrial companies, have constituted a joint statement to the Minister of Finance and the Minister of Foreign Affairs saying that objects of investments in conducting the construction of railroads, the opening of government highways and other works on rivers and canals. All other undertakings they declare should be left outside the sphere of the new syndicate.

It has been stated that the amount of the loan which banking groups of the United States, Great Britain, France and Japan are to make to the Chinese government, probably will be about \$100,000,000, to be paid in four installments of \$25,000,000 each over a period of years.

The proceeds of the loan, it has been stated, will be used for the building of railroads and for the general economic development of the country. Thirty-seven American banks will participate in the loan.
