DEATH SUMMONS VILLAGE SMITHY

Thomas Dennill Estep, For 40 Years Resident of Alexandria, Passes Away

In politics he was a Republican, and always took an active part in civic and municipal affairs of his town. He served two terms on the school board and was a member of the Council for twelve years. He was a member of the Presbyterian church, which he served for many years as a trustee.

Freak Snake Killed in Franklin County

Waynesboro, Pa., Aug. 1.—At Brownsville, at the foot of the Blue Ridge mountains, south of Waynesboro, the other day a copperhead snake with two well formed feet was killed by Ira L. Kaetzel. The reptile measured two feet four inches and three and one half inches in circumference. The feet are located about six inches from the tip of the tail. The legs are three and three-quarters of an inch in length, while the feet are round and about twice the size of the leg, and are covered with a hard gristle. The snake has been preserved in alcohol.
