

VISCOUNT GREY REACHES AMERICA

New British Ambassador to U. S. Deplores His Poor Sight

New York, Sept. 27.—Arriving here aboard the steamship Mauretania to assume his new post as British Ambassador to the United States, Viscount Grey, wearing black glasses, deplored his poor eye sight which compelled him to withdraw for three years from public life and which he said would make his mission in this country "comparatively short."

Greeted by a group of British officers from the embassy in Washington, headed by Robert S. Lindsay, Viscount Grey expressed his delight at the attention shown him by newspaper men and photographers. He will leave at once for Washington. The new Ambassador asserted that he had not come to put forward any new proposals for treaties and alliances, but that his object in accepting the post was to promote the existing good will between American and British peoples as far as he has the strength or the opportunity.

He asserted that his view on the League of Nations, previously expressed, when he said last May that "he was delighted with the covenant," had not changed. He also expressed keen regret at the news of the illness of President Wilson and the wish that it was not serious.

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Princeton Launches Endowment Campaign

Princeton, N. J., Sept. 27.—Princeton launched a \$14,000,000 endowment campaign here yesterday at a meeting of the General Endowment Committee. The first day's drive resulted in pledges aggregating \$1,696,250, representing 24 subscriptions.

The money will be used primarily to increase the salaries of professors and to provide funds for new professorships.

Mechanicsburg Church To Reopen Tomorrow

The Church of God, Mechanicsburg, has been undergoing repairs, including the removal of the spire and rebuilding some of the tower to insure safety. The exterior has been frescoed. Two large memorial windows were placed in the lower room at the front. The Sunday School room was enlarged and made more suitable for the work of the department. New memorial windows were placed in the Sunday School room in memory of the superintendents who have served since the organization of the school in 1852. The repairs cost approximately \$5,000, nearly all of which has been provided for, either by pledges or cash.

Baptist church, the Rev. E. Luther Cunningham, pastor, under the auspices of the Foreign Missionary Board.

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
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
