### 10 STATE BOARDS NOW IN OFFICE

Architects Will Make Tenth to Have Charge of State Licensing System

Organization of the new State Board of Examiners of Architects and Engineers will make the tenth State Board in charge of examination and licensing. The act creating the new architects' board was passed by the recent Legislature after attempts in two recent sessions, and the board will devise a system of examinations. There has been talk of a similar board for engineers in a legislative session.

### Reveals German Plans For Mexican Colonization

Mexico City, Monday, Oct. 20.—Concrete evidence of German colonization plans for Mexico was revealed today when the announcement of an enterprise for the irrigation of 200,000 hectares of land in the Puerta river valley in the State of Sinaloa, where thousands of German emigrants are expected to buy small parcels of land on a 20-year payment plan.

The corporation is being floated by Jose Meakany, a Mexico City capitalist, with the support of General Ramon Turbe, Governor of Sinaloa. It is proposed to construct a dam at Saint Blas, securing from the government a concession for the use of enough water from the Puerta river for the proposed colony. The land is declared to be extremely fertile and the plan is being backed by German banks here.

### Steel Strikers Lose Fight For Injunction

Pittsburgh, Oct. 21.—The steel workers lost in the first inning when a preliminary injunction was refused by Judges Ford and Shafer, in Common Pleas Court, to Lee Bennett and officials of the Good Cheer Lodge No. 145, Amalgamated Association of Iron and Tin Workers, to restrain Mayor E. V. Babcock and other city authorities from interfering with a meeting which it is proposed to hold at Birmingham Turner Hall, on Wednesday night, October 22. It is proposed among other things to initiate 100 or more members in the organization on that night. A similar meeting was attempted last Thursday night, but the police prevented it.

Geneva, Oct. 20.—A smugglers' tunnel 700 yards long under the Swiss-Austrian border has been found. It is reported by the police at Kreuzlingen a small town at the lower end of Lake Constance. They are supposed to have been operating here for several years, handling contraband goods. ### Praeger Plans Trans-U. S. Air Mail For Next Spring

New York, Oct. 21.—Plans for the extension by the Post Office Department of the aerial mail service, now in operation between New York and Washington, New York and Cleveland and Cleveland and Chicago, to include a transcontinental route from New York to San Francisco by next spring, were announced by Second Assistant Postmaster General Otto Praeger as a result of the Army's cross-continent air race.

Cities at which the mail planes will stop after leaving New York, according to Mr. Praeger, are Cleveland, Chicago, Omaha, Salt Lake City, Carson City and San Francisco, with emergency stops at Bellefonte, Pa., Bryan, O., Des Moines, Cheyenne, Wyo., and Battle Mountain, Nev.
