

CRUSADE AGAINST JEWS IN GERMANY

Pan-German Newspapers and Officer Caste Said to Be Behind It

Berlin, (Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The Hansa Bund of Hamburg, a mercantile association of the great port, has requested the publishers of the German Officers' Gazette to publish a demand upon the public not to read Jewish newspapers. The demand mentions as some of the more prominent German papers owned by Jews, the Berlin Tageblatt, the Ullstein papers, Vossische Zeitung, Berliner Zeitung and Mittag, Morgenpost and the National Zeitung.

This is the latest and most direct move in the anti-Semitic campaign that is growing in Germany. It is another example of the revolution, which, in response with it every vestige of control over everything.

Some Talk of Pogroms

The Pan-German papers, of course, are behind the anti-Jewish campaign, becoming bolder and bolder week by week, until some virtually plead for pogroms, while others content themselves with earnest hopes that all the Jews will leave Germany and go to Palestine—or anywhere else in the world than Germany.

The agitation began, as the Associated Press correspondent had ample opportunity to see, in Bavaria shortly after the armistice and the revolution. It was at first inspired by opponents of Kurt Eisner and the other Jews who constituted a part of the Government of that first republic in Bavaria. It was furthered chiefly by the officer caste, which found thousands of sympathizers among the real Bavarians, who joined the movement in dislike of not having the foreign elements that had invaded Bavaria during the war.

Thence it spread with ever-increasing rapidity and blazed out in Northern Germany, where it has now become a force that had been more or less dormant because of governmental restrictions. It has achieved greater headway because some members of the present government are Jews.

Jewish Soldiers Oppressed

Minister of Defense Noske recently took steps to prevent a threatened pogrom, which evoked a letter from a Pan-German in the compilation of him on his attitude toward pogroms.

Officers of troops in the East repeatedly are accused of deliberately furthering an oppression of their Jewish soldiers. All in all, the life of the Hebrew is one of the most uncomfortable in Germany.

Berlin is flooded with Anti-Semitic literature. The west end of the city is the particular stamping ground of those who distribute it. The antagonism to Jews extends to almost every stratum of the German population. Magazines, weeklies and monthlies devote columns to the subject.

Germany Has Also Lost Her National Holidays

Berlin.—Germany to-day is without a national holiday—a curiosity among nations. The revolution gave a knockout blow to the popular holiday celebration of "Kaiser's Birthday" and the loss of the war has put a quietus on Germany's Fourth of July day—Sedan Day.

Hardly a handful of flags were run up or hung out in all Berlin on the latest Sedan Day. A conspicuous "patriotic" exception was the Imperial Admiralty Building, over which waved the German ex-navy's war flag.

At the foot of the monument of Kaiser Wilhelm "the Grocer" (as he was nicknamed by doughboys, seeing the same person's monumental equestrian statue in Cologne at the confluence of the Rhine and Moselle) admirers of monarchy had laid one solitary wreath, decorated with streamers in the old imperial national colors, black, white and red.

Shockers Were Shocked; Looters Were Looted

Berlin.—Two of the famous Iron Division in Lithuania, Hubert Diemer and Fritz Pischal, members of the Shock Battalion Wildemann, gave their battalion a real shock by stealing the war chest, containing 180,000 marks, mostly in 1,000-mark bills, with some Russian silver and paper money thrown in.

Berlin detectives became suspicious of the lavish purchases made by two young soldiers on a shopping expedition in and about the Friedrichstrasse and arresting them revealed their identity as the two shock thieves of the Iron Division.

They had only 50,000 marks left. They confessed that on the railway trip to Berlin they fell asleep and were robbed of considerable money. Arrived in Berlin, they went to a nobby tailor and ordered new clothes.

British People Saved Much During the War

London, Oct. 31.—The controller of post office savings banks has announced that savings was practiced in Great Britain during the war on a scale never before approached. This has caused some surprise as British statesmen have been so urgently pleading for public economy and the newspapers have been lamenting the increase of reckless spending.


