MAKE RAID ON BERLIN CAFES

Women Caught in Net Set by Police to Close Infamous Cabarets

Berlin, Nov. 7.—Fifty-one of the more notorious of Berlin's famous, or infamous, night-life cafes and cabarets, where all closing regulations were ignored, electric lights were burned until morning and scenes of drunkenness were enacted, were raided by the new safety police and squads of the old force.

The bands were playing, and all was joyous, when one lone police officer in plain clothes entered each of the 51 resorts. At first he was greeted with laughter, but when the exits were closed most of the patrons and many of the managers, dived for the cellars, where they were easily rounded up.

It was a variegated throng that was gathered at the police station and finally at police headquarters at the Alexander square. Some tried

to laugh the affair away, others were angry and all seemed to be ashamed at being caught. The throng included not only a number of illicit traders and their women friends, but several socially well known people as well. The police announce the raids will continue.

FAILS TO GET VOTE ON TREATY

Hitchcock's Call Goes Down After Lively Parliamentary Skirmish

Washington, Nov. 7.—After a sharp and fruitless parliamentary skirmish during which a vote on ratification of the Peace Treaty without reservations for a time seemed imminent, the Senate late yesterday went back to its regular order of business and began formal consideration of the reservations recommended by the Foreign Relations Committee.

Senator Hitchcock accepted the challenge of Senator Lodge and made a motion that the Senate ratify the Treaty without reservations. He then demanded a roll call.

Senator Hitchcock immediately from the

Committee of the Whole in order to consider resolutions of ratification. Underwood Takes Stand There was a wide difference of opinion as to what would be the status of the Treaty should the resolutions attached, be defeated.

Senator Underwood said he would vote against the resolution containing reservations and Senator Lodge warned that if the Treaty were rejected, with reservations attached, the delay that would follow would "be the delay of death."

CRET TO PLAN ART BUILDING Philadelphia, Nov. 7.—Paul Cret, professor of architectural design at the University of Pennsylvania, will plan the \$2,000,000 Institute of Art, which will be built in Detroit. Prof. Cret, as a result of a conference with the directors of the Detroit Art Institute, will begin work on preliminary plans immediately.
