RADICALS WHO REFUSE TO EAT MAY BE LET DIE.

Legal Report Indicates Tacoma Would Not Be Responsible

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 29.—The city council has agreed to let the twenty-two alleged I. W. W. who are on hunger strike in the city jail starve if they desired, following a report from Assistant City Attorney Frank Carnahan that the city could not be held responsible.

The prisoners have not eaten for forty-two hours. They also have refused to talk with their jailers. Why the strikers have refused to eat, state the cause of their refusal to eat, it was understood that they were protesting against being detained in the city jail. They had asked to be transferred to the county jail where additional alleged I. W. W. were held, but this was refused because the cells were full.

Silvertone, which has been with us for two or three seasons, has no wise diminished its popularity, still taking the lead in top coats. The one pictured is developed in brown silvertone on loose lines, such as are shown only in the highest priced models. A shallow yoke of the material is the foundation of this garment, to which the loose one-piece coat is shirred. The sleeve is cut separately and seamed to the garment so skillfully that the coat, aside from the yoke, seems to be cut in one piece. Banded three times round the bottom with skunk, kolinsky or mole, and with a deep-rolling collar of the same, this elegant little model is smart for all occasions. It closes to a little below the yokeline with two-toned buttons and another button under the crossed-over double belt, which fastens with a single button and buttonhole at the left side. Spats in Havana brown or a lighter shade of tan are strong for wear with top coats, which, all for feather in breast-trimmed hats in lighter shades serve by way of contrast to liven so dark a garment.

NEW MEXICAN REVOLT STORIES ARE CONFLICTING

Mexican Sources Deny Break Between Carranza and General Obregon

Reports of a new revolution in Mexico, this time between the factions of President Carranza and General Alvaro Obregon, were conflicting early to-day. Dispatches from the interior of Mexico and information given out by Mexican representatives on the American side of the border, deny there has been a "break" between the two factions. While other reports, seeming coming from independent sources, confirm dispatches of yesterday that actual fighting has taken place.

An Associated Press dispatch from Mexico City last night said that there is "no foundation for the rumor in circulation in the United States that there has been fighting in Mexico City between the factions of President Carranza and General Alvaro Obregon."

NEW OUTBREAKS
San Antonio, Tex., Nov. 29.—Fresh outbreaks between the sympathizers of General Alvaro Obregon and General Pablo Gonzales in Mexico City were reported last night in a message from Mexico City via Laredo, to a responsible Mexican here. President Carranza has left General Gonzales in charge and fled to Queretaro, the opposing forces are taking sides regardless of what general they have been serving under, the message stated.

SAYS REPORTS ARE FALSE
Nogales, Sonora, Mex., Nov. 29.—Governor Adolfo De La Huerta, in a message received here last night, said he had received a telegram from General Carranza last night, asking him to give complete denial to reports of clashes between troops of President Carranza and adherents of General Obregon.

General Obregon's wife received a message from her husband yesterday afternoon, it said: "Reports of disturbances between Carranza forces and my adherents are false. Everything is tranquil here."

ANOTHER DENIAL
San Antonio, Tex., Nov. 29.—The Mexican consul at Laredo wired here last evening that he was in touch with Mexico City at 6:30 p. m. and that there has been no clashes in the city between followers of Generals Alvaro Obregon and Pablo Gonzales. President Carranza was still in the city, the message said.

Telegrams asserting that fighting was going on in Mexico City between adherents of Generals Obregon and Gonzales, candidates for the Mexican presidency were received. The messages described what was declared to be a general revolt planned throughout Mexico to overthrow President Carranza and eliminate General Gonzales as a political opponent to General Obregon.

One message from Mexico City to a prominent Mexican refugee here said fighting was going on in the streets. General Benjamin Hill, said to be an Obregon leader, was described as aiding in the fight to overthrow Carranza and defeat Gonzales.

JORDAN MOTORS EXPAND PLANT

Increase Production During Present Year by More Than Four Hundred Per Cent.

A striking example of the rapidity with which motor car manufacturers are increasing production to meet the growing demand, is that of the Jordan Motor Car Company, Inc. This Cleveland company in the second quarter of the current year produced 100 per cent more cars than in the first quarter.
