## PRINCETON MEN HERE SATURDAY

To Participate in Big Program at Harrisburg Academy

Plans have been completed for the visit of a group of Princeton men to the Harrisburg Academy over this weekend. The deputation comes under the auspices of The Philadelphia Society which is the Young Men's Christian Association of Princeton University. The arrangements for the visit have been made by David R. Shotwell, an alumnus of the Academy in the class of 1914 and of Princeton Class of 1918. Shotwell is the Philadelphia Secretary of the Philadelphia Society.

He served in the Balkan states during the war and since his return from the service has been devoting all his time to the furtherance of Christian work in Princeton University. The men who will accompany Shotwell are well-known in the various circles of the University life.

The other members of the party are: Al. Swede, an old Mercersburg boy, holder of the interscholastic two-mile record and winner of the Yale-Princeton Cross Country Run this fall. George Bryan, the spokesman for the party is also a member of the Princeton University Cross Country team. "Chuck" Carpenter, from Georgia, who is a member of the wrestling and track teams.

The visitors will arrive in Harrisburg about 7:30 P. M. Saturday and it is planned to make Saturday evening a Princeton evening at the Academy. There will be various impromptu speeches, many songs and general good-fellowship. It is hoped that every Princeton Alumnus of Harrisburg and vicinity will find it possible to be on deck at 7:30 P. M., Saturday evening, Dec. 6th, to meet this delegation and give them a cordial welcome to Harrisburg.

## CARPENTIER WINS IN EASY STYLE

Joe Beckett Fails to Stand Up to Opponent For One Full Round

London, Dec. 5.—Hoborn Stadium, Kingside—Georges Carpentier, the French fighter, won the heavyweight championship of Europe here to-night by defeating Joe Beckett, champion of England. Carpentier knocked Beckett out in the first round. The knockout came after one minute and ten seconds of fighting.

After the fight Beckett said to the newspaper men: "I hadn't started to fight when I got it. I didn't realize what had happened. I was just falling in for the first round, when he slipped in."

In the Hoborn Stadium to-night an English debacle was staged before the Prince of Wales, noblemen and some of the wealthiest men of the British empire.

A Gory Wreck  
Joe Beckett, heavyweight champion of England, wearing a union jack twisted around his waist, fell in amazingly quick time before Georges Carpentier, heavyweight champion of France.

Beckett Had Weight  
Overcoming a handicap of fourteen pounds of English beef, the clean-cut and energetic Frenchman started a storm of blows just after the handshake that quickly overwhelmed the astounded Beckett.

Taking the aggressive, Carpentier landed a jab to Beckett's face and easily dodged a right-handed uppercut that the Britisher started in return. After a bit of boxing, in which the Frenchman clearly out-pointed his lethargic opponent, Carpentier shot a right-handed uppercut with every bit of his strength behind it.

Quick Ending  
It was one of the quickest championship fights ever held under the Marquis of Queensbury rules and came so suddenly that for a while the tremendous gathering of boxing lovers stayed pinned to their seats dumbfounded. Then when they realized what had happened before their wide-open eyes, the drama being enacted so quickly that it could not be followed, they arose and soon were cheering the remarkable feat of the victor.


Blow Was Decisive  
Seventy-four seconds, as announced by the official timer, sufficed to decide whether Carpentier or Beckett should meet Jack Dempsey, the American heavyweight, for the championship of the world, in June next. From the moment the referee, B. J. Angle, called time, Carpentier had the battle entirely in his own hands. Beckett never had a chance of hitting the agile Frenchman, who landed blows with enormous strength whenever he felt inclined.

Amid absolute stillness most of the spectators could hear the terrific crack of the swing that put Beckett to sleep. There was a roar of cheering as Carpentier assisted Beckett to his corner, where the Englishman opened his astonished eyes and saw his opponent being carried on the shoulders of some of the enthusiasts around the ring.

The contestants presented a notable difference in appearance when they stripped and were introduced—Beckett swarthy and muscular, Carpentier white-skinned, with slight figure. Carpentier looked about him as though accustomed to his surroundings; Beckett seemed somewhat nervous.

Peers and peereesses, members of the House of Commons, high officials of state, many women, most of them in evening dress, and the Prince of Wales, newly returned from his American trip, looked the fighters over critically as they squared up. The Prince congratulated the winner after the fight.

"I am ready to fight Carpentier or any other fighter in the world—if I get my price," said Dempsey. "Carpentier in all probability will be my next opponent and the meeting probably will come off next spring."

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

Clarence Beck, the former Technical High School star, is now certain to hold down the left tackle position and give promise of putting up a wonderful game beside Dick Rauch. A leg injury received while driving an ambulance in Italy, and a bad back injury received in his freshman year at State, led Beck to transfer his football play to the line where there would be less danger of these weaknesses giving him trouble.

He was slated to start the Pitt game on Thanksgiving, but wrenched his ankle in practice the day before, and was not in the best of condition to get into that contest at the start. He substituted for Cubbage in the last quarter when Ben wrenched his ankle.

Other Local Stars  
Two other Harrisburgers will also be in the spotlight at State next fall, Glenn Killinger, former Tech backfielder player, and Joe Light-

ner, of Marysville, both of whom are expected to give the backfield men a hard fight for their jobs. Although he reported late for practice this year, Bezzel believes Lightner it have the makings of a first class class player, and worked him throughout the Lehigh and Cornell game this fall.

## Mountain High School Cage League to Start Soon
