expenses for traveling, first class meals, at the best hotels, eating good meals, together with reasonable entertainment, such as the theater and the opera, amounted to only \$12.00.

Belated homegoers risk darkness, so there isn't much stirring when the illumination is extinguished."

"Wood is now the principal item of fuel, as most of the coal produced in the Ruhr basin is going to France to reimburse her for her enormous losses."

"German officers are still much in evidence in Berlin, and they parade the streets and sit in the high-priced cafes with their blouses covered with decorations of iron crosses and yore. The chances of these men bringing the fallen Kaiser back to the head of the government are mighty slim."

"Some of the views that the pan-Germans express are absurd. One element looks forward to setting the United States as an ally, with the ultimate object of both countries uniting against England and France."

Pigeons vs. Wireless; Birds Are Dependable
