Our river, as we anticipated, has again commenced to rise. There being 6 feet large on Harpeth shoals, with light prospects of still more water. The weather is pleasant and mild, with indications of rain. Our wharf at present presents quite an active appearance, though very disagreeable to feet from about 11 o'clock. Upon consulting with our very worthy City Marshal, we learn that the cause of the bad condition of the landing is entirely beyond the control of the city authorities, as they had contemplated that through the interposition of Providence to have it frozen, and they certainly do not anticipate a thaw but a *friz*. In the former weather they did contemplate a thaw, but they assured the high winds would blow away the dust. Therefore, all concerned must rest easy until this good time comes and they feel it, for if it is realized now it will be able to see it for the dust that will be thrown in their eyes.
