Body of Murdered Man Dismembered Coroner Testifies Work Must Have Been Done by One Familiar With Anatomy

Goehland, Va., Jan. 4.—Dr. L. K. Leake, coroner of Goehland county, testifying today at the trial of Dr. Asa W. Chamberlain, charged with murdering his brother, Albert P. Chamberlain, asserted that the victim's body must have been dismembered by a person thoroughly familiar with anatomy.

Dr. Leake told how the flesh had been scraped from the back of the head, how the limbs were severed at the joints and how smoothly incisions had been made in accomplishing this work.

John Sims, a negro, told of finding the torso while digging in Dr. Chamberlain's garden. Samuel Bates, another negro, who was with Sims at the time of the finding of the torso, corroborated the testimony.

No Use to Return Notification Cards Those Being Mailed Simply. Tell Registrant to What Class He Belongs.

The various local exemption boards are now in receipt of an enormous number of notification cards sent out by the boards.
