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WHALEN AGAIN IN LIMELIGHT

Former East Chattanooga Man in Toils of Law at Athens Charged With Murder.

A new chapter in the story of the finding of the dead body of a man in the woods near Athens, Tenn., has developed in the arrest of Carl Whalen, who is held without bail on the charge of murder.

The body was discovered during the latter part of December by a party of hunters who found the corpse in a ditch near the Chattanooga-Athens road. It is believed the body had been lying there for fully two months, as it was badly decomposed.

At the inquest no light was thrown on the mystery of the murder, the only clues being three articles found on the dead man's person—a handkerchief, with the initials "G. L. W." on it, an express receipt for the shipment of a suitcase from Wade Smith, Salisbury, N. C., to Fred Smith, Wichita, Kan., and a suitcase key.

No developments occurred until last Saturday, when Joe Gossett, Jr., a farmer, learning an investigation was being made in Athens, volunteered such information as led to the arrest of Whalen Tuesday.

Gossett, in his evidence stated that he and Whalen were milking cows one evening, when Whalen confidentially told him of the story of the murder. Gossett did not believe Whalen's story, as this was before the body had been found, and merely thought it was a fiction invented in the mind of Whalen.

Gossett said that according to Whalen's story, Wade Smith and himself were returning from a hobo trip to Knoxville, and jumping off a freight train about a mile from Athens, went toward the farm of Joe Gossett, Jr. While going through the woods near the Chattanooga road, they became engaged in a quarrel from which the tragedy arose. According to Gossett, Whalen declared he hit Smith with a brakelike, which he was carrying, cracking his skull. Whalen then went to Sheffield, Ala., where he worked until about the first of December, then going to Athens.

Carl Whalen is well known in Chattanooga, being the son of James Whalen, of East Chattanooga. He has from his boyhood, always been known as a bad citizen. When a schoolboy he always had trouble with his teachers, and would not be allowed after suspension to attend the East Chattanooga schools.

When almost 18 years of age, so uncontrollable was he by his parents that he was not allowed to remain at home with them.

At that time the late C. A. Bedell, who was murdered by the shipper, attempted to care for the boy, until it was of no use. Mr. Bedell and his wife kept a refreshment stand at Boyce, at the end of the East Chattanooga street car line.

NEGRO FIEND BURNED AT STAKE

Mississippi Mob Wreaks Vengeance on Negro Who Murdered Miss Vera Willis.

Hazelhurst, Miss., Jan. 17.—A mob of several hundred citizens of Hazelhurst, headed by the father of Miss Vera Willis, who was murdered near here last yesterday, took Jim Edwards, a negro, from the county jail early this morning and burned him.

Mr. Willis, according to the county officers, asked the privilege of providing the oil which was used to burn him. The lynching took place about a mile and a half west of Hazelhurst, near the scene of the girl's murder.

The mob then its endeavors to secure entrance to the jail about 11:30 o'clock last night and used crowbars and battering rams which did considerable damage to the building.

Edwards was arrested early yesterday, after shoes found in his cabin near the place where Miss Willis was killed, had been fitted to his feet. Blood was found on his feet, it is said.

Three other negroes, who were in the jail charged with complicity in the murder, were not molested.

Edwards confessed the crime to twelve men who entered his cell. After he had been taken outside the jail, he repudiated the confession, saying he had told the story, hoping it would go easier with him.

BAGS OF SEAWEED PROTECT ART WORKS

London, Dec. 20.—(Correspondence Associated Press.)—The work of the Italian authorities in preserving Italy's art treasures against bombardment was described today in a report.

Italy has been fully alive to her responsibility for the art of which she is the guardian, said the lecturer, "and has spared nothing in her endeavor to protect her cities and her treasures."

In Venetian, Lombardian and Tuscan towns I saw whole buildings wrapped up. Outdoor monuments are often completely enclosed in what look like dog kennels.

In many cases new masonry has been put in to strengthen historic structures, and elaborate systems of drainage have been installed to further reinforce the natural strength of the buildings.

"Bags of seaweed, very light and elastic, have been extensively and successfully used in Venice for St. Mark's and other buildings. Bronzes, pictures and small monuments have been removed in colossal packing cases and taken to places of safety."

Some have been sandbagged, others within, and every monument or architectural masterpiece separately shrouded.

"Venice has presented a difficult problem because of the soft soil on which it is built, making every masonry protection often impossible. One of the most difficult pieces of protective work done was the removal of Titian's great Assumption, a part of the wall of the academy having been taken down to get it out."

"Four hundred bombs have thus far been dropped in Venice by enemy airplanes. That the number is not much larger is due to the superb defensive work of the Italian airmen."
