TO BRING WAR NEARER PEOPLE

Gov. Rye Issues Call for Conferences in All Divisions of Tennessee.

Inaugurating a state-wide campaign to bring the war closer to the people, to bring a fuller realization of the necessity for making sacrifices and observing all of the requests and regulations of the several departments of the national government, Gov. Tom C. Rye has issued calls for conferences in Middle Tennessee, in West Tennessee and in East Tennessee.

Tennessee will be held on Thursday, Jan. 31, at Knoxville, and that for West Tennessee at Memphis on Monday, Feb. 4, at 10 o'clock.

The governor has summoned the following named in their respective divisions to attend the conference. Chairmen of county councils of defense, chairmen of women's work of councils of defense, food administrators, fuel administrators, all representatives of the food and fuel administrations, county agricultural agents (both men and women), sheriffs, county judges, clerks of courts, mayors, chiefs of police, city and county superintendents of public instruction, members of city and county boards of education, presidents and secretaries of Red Cross chapters and auxiliaries, heads of army and navy Y. M. C. A. organizations, editors of all newspapers, agents and officers of the United States government.

The governor's call is as follows: "Jan. 18, 1918. "Dear Sir—That our people may be fully informed as to the situation in the nation in this awful crisis, to arouse them to a full appreciation of the dangers which threaten our liberties and to bring the war activities of the nation closer to them, I have called a conference of public officials and those charged with the direction of war activities in the counties of Middle Tennessee, to be held in the hall of the house of representatives in Nashville, on Monday, Jan. 28, 1918, at 10 o'clock a.m.

"At this conference the following are expected to attend: Chairmen of councils of defense, chairmen of women's committees of councils of defense, food administrators, fuel administrators, representatives of the food and fuel administrations, county agricultural agents (men and women), sheriffs, county judges, clerks of courts, mayors, chiefs of police, city and county boards of education, presidents and secretaries of Red Cross chapters and auxiliaries, heads of army and navy Y. M. C. A. organizations, editors of all newspapers, agents and officers of the United States government in Middle Tennessee.

"This call is addressed to you personally. The winning of this war is going to require all of the devotion, sacrifice and the resources of all our people. This is a great war of peoples. Every citizen has a vital and a personal task to perform in this crisis. Therefore I call upon you to lay aside all other business, forsake all other interests and attend this conference. Dependents Receiving Checks From Government

Soldiers at Chickamauga Park Learn Through Letters From Home That Allotments and Allowances Are Reaching Families—Overseas Forces First Provided For.

Letters from home tell the soldiers at Chickamauga park that their dependents are receiving checks from the treasury department, which has charge of the disbursements of allotments and allowances. The information has brought relief to many anxious minds.

Others soon may expect similar information, for the department is said to be working with all possible haste to place the relief promised in the proper hands.

It has been stated, though not officially confirmed, that when the immense task of making up the lists of persons entitled to allowances was begun, the start was made with the forces overseas, and that the depend-

ents of the men who are fighting in France are the first to receive their checks from the government. Friday morning information was sent to The News concerning four different cases wherein allotments are said to have been made by soldiers, and no checks have yet been received by the dependents. The other case was disclosed wherein the soldier has failed or refused to make provision for a wife with whom he has not lived for two years or more. This information will be forwarded to Washington through Tennessee's representatives who are interested in the proper distribution of the relief which congress has provided in such cases.

BOLSHEVIK TROOPS TEAR UP RAILROADS Ukrainian Units Lured Into Trap and Then Disarmed and Made Prisoners.

Stockholm, Jan. 18.—The local Ukrainian information bureau announces that it is in possession of information showing that the Russian bolshevik troops are tearing up railroads, destroying stations and undermining bridges in order to capture or disperse Ukrainian troops coming northward.

The bureau says the bolshevik troops repeatedly have lured Ukrainian units into a trap near Minsk, disarmed them, committed various deeds of violence and then sent them north as prisoners. The announcement adds that great numbers of German prisoners are returning from Siberia and that the Ukrainians are taking their places.
